

The House Committee on Judiciary offers the following substitute to HB 770:

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

1 To amend Title 17 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to criminal procedure,
 2 so as to enact the "Georgia Indigent Defense Act"; to provide a short title; to define certain
 3 terms; to provide for the appointment of a circuit public defender in each judicial circuit; to
 4 provide for eligibility; to provide for the appointment of conflict counsel; to provide for the
 5 representation of indigent persons in certain cases; to provide for duties of a circuit public
 6 defender; to provide for a salary; to prohibit the practice of law for profit; to provide for
 7 reimbursement of expenses; to provide for a budget; to provide for the appointment of
 8 assistant public defenders and their salaries; to provide for the appointment of investigators
 9 and their salaries; to provide for the filling of a vacancy in office; to provide for the
 10 employment of staff; to provide for the status of employees as public employees; to provide
 11 for additional positions paid for by counties; to provide that no attorney employed full time
 12 by the circuit public defender shall engage in the private practice of law for profit; to provide
 13 for the provision of offices and facilities by counties; to provide for contracting with the
 14 circuit public defender; to provide for the removal of a circuit public defender for cause; to
 15 authorize third-year law students to assist circuit public defenders; to provide qualifications;
 16 to create the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council; to provide for membership,
 17 appointment, and terms of office; to provide for duties; to provide for continuing legal
 18 education; to provide for a report of activities; to provide that such council shall assume all
 19 duties, responsibilities, liabilities, assets, and obligations of the Georgia Indigent Defense
 20 Council; to provide that the Georgia Indigent Defense Council shall be abolished; to provide
 21 for a transition; to provide for the office of the multicounty public defender; to provide for
 22 legal status; to provide that the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council shall be
 23 responsible for such office; to provide for the appointment of multicounty public defenders;
 24 to provide for salaries and a budget; to provide for the employment of personnel; to provide
 25 for transition; to provide for the defense of persons accused of a capital felony; to provide
 26 for the office of mental health advocacy; to provide that such office shall be a continuation
 27 of the mental health advocacy division of the Georgia Indigent Defense Council; to provide
 28 for a budget; to provide for the employment of personnel; to provide for the representation

1 of persons adjudged or alleging insanity; to continue in effect the laws relating to the defense
 2 of indigents in capital cases for a certain period of time; to provide for the appointment of
 3 defense attorneys; to provide for representation upon appeal; to provide for reimbursement;
 4 to amend Title 15 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to courts, so as to
 5 change certain references; to amend Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
 6 relating to crimes and offenses, so as to change certain references; to amend Title 35 of the
 7 Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to law enforcement officers and agencies, so
 8 as to change certain references; to amend Code Section 36-32-1 of the Official Code of
 9 Georgia Annotated, relating to the establishment of municipal courts, punishments, and the
 10 selection, election, or appointment of the mayor pro tempore or recorder pro tempore, so as
 11 to provide for certain defense of indigent persons; to provide for effective dates; to repeal
 12 conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

14 **SECTION 1.**

15 Title 17 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to criminal procedure, is
 16 amended by striking Chapter 12, relating of the legal defense of indigents, and inserting in
 17 lieu thereof the following:

18 "CHAPTER 12
 19 ARTICLE 1

20 17-12-1.

21 (a) This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the 'Georgia Indigent Defense Act of
 22 2003.'

23 (b) The purpose of this chapter is to ensure that all indigent defendants who are entitled
 24 to legal representation under the Constitution and laws of the United States and the State
 25 of Georgia are provided uniformly effective representation in each of the judicial circuits
 26 of the State of Georgia. Toward that goal, this article establishes a state-wide, independent
 27 Georgia Public Defender Standards Council.

28 (c) The General Assembly declares that the council shall at all times serve its clients
 29 independently of any political considerations or private interests and conduct the business
 30 of the board in accordance with all applicable standards of ethics, performance, and
 31 professionalism.

1 17-12-2.

2 As used in this article, the term 'council' means the Georgia Public Defender Standards
3 Council.

4 17-12-3.

5 (a) There is created the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council to be composed of 15
6 members.

7 (b) The membership of the council shall be appointed as follows:

8 (1) Two members shall be appointed by the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, the
9 Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of
10 Georgia, and the Chief Judge of the Georgia Court of Appeals. The members of the
11 council shall be individuals with significant experience working in the criminal justice
12 system or who have demonstrated a strong commitment to the provision of adequate and
13 effective representation of indigent defendants. These members shall serve terms of four
14 years;

15 (2) In addition, there shall be five circuit public defenders who shall serve on the council.
16 After the initial appointments as set forth in paragraph (3) of this subsection, the first
17 subsequent council shall be five circuit public defenders from districts one, three, five,
18 seven, and nine of the ten judicial administration districts in the state. The second
19 subsequent council shall be five circuit public defenders from districts two, four, six,
20 eight, and ten of the ten judicial administration districts in the state. Each district shall
21 be represented in turn by the circuit public defenders of the judicial circuit of the district
22 in alphabetical order and rotating through the circuits in alphabetical order. These
23 members shall serve terms of two years;

24 (3) All initial appointments shall be made to become members of the council on July 1,
25 2003, and their successors shall become members of the council on July 1 following their
26 appointment. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph (2) of this subsection, the
27 initial members representing the ten judicial administration districts shall be made by the
28 Supreme Court of Georgia. Each member shall be engaged on a full-time basis in the
29 provision of criminal defense to the indigent;

30 (4) Any vacancy for a member appointed pursuant to paragraphs (1) and (3) of this
31 subsection shall be filled by the appointing authority; and

32 (5) Any vacancy for a member appointed pursuant to paragraph (2) of this subsection
33 shall be the successor to the circuit public defender as set forth in subsection (d) of Code
34 Section 17-12-21.

35 (c) In making these appointments, the appointing authorities shall seek to identify and
36 appoint persons who represent a diversity of backgrounds and experience, and shall receive

1 suggestions from the State Bar of Georgia, state and local bar associations, the Georgia
2 Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, the councils representing the various categories
3 of state court judges in Georgia, and the Prosecuting Attorneys' Council of the State of
4 Georgia, as well as from the public and other interested organizations and individuals
5 within the state.

6 (d) This Code section shall become effective on July 1, 2003, for purposes of making the
7 initial appointments to the council.

8 17-12-4.

9 (a) The council:

10 (1) Shall be a legal entity;

11 (2) Shall have perpetual existence;

12 (3) May contract;

13 (4) May own property;

14 (5) May accept funds, grants, and gifts from any public or private source, which shall be
15 used to defray the expenses incident to implementing its purposes;

16 (6) May adopt and use an official seal;

17 (7) May establish a principal office;

18 (8) May hire such administrative and clerical personnel as may be necessary and
19 appropriate to fulfill its purposes; and

20 (9) Shall have such other powers, privileges, and duties as may be reasonable and
21 necessary for the proper fulfillment of its purposes.

22 (b) The council shall establish auditing procedures as may be required in connection with
23 the handling of public funds. The state auditor is authorized and directed to make an
24 annual audit of the transactions of the council and to make a complete report of the same
25 to the General Assembly. The report shall disclose all moneys received by the council and
26 all expenditures made by the council, including administrative expense. The state auditor
27 shall also make an audit of the affairs of the council at any time when requested to do so
28 by a majority of the council or by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Georgia.

29 (c) The council may not provide compensation from its funds to any administrative or
30 clerical personnel employed by the council if the personnel are then receiving retirement
31 compensation from any retirement or pension fund created by Title 47 to provide
32 compensation for past services as a judicial officer, prosecuting attorney, indigent defense
33 attorney, court officer, or law enforcement officer except for county or municipal
34 retirement funds.

1 17-12-5.

2 (a) The council shall assist the public defenders throughout the state in their efforts to
3 provide adequate legal defense to the indigent. Assistance may include:

4 (1) The preparation and distribution of a basic defense manual and other educational
5 materials;

6 (2) The preparation and distribution of model forms and documents employed in indigent
7 defense;

8 (3) The promotion of and assistance in the training of indigent defense attorneys;

9 (4) The provision of legal research assistance to public defenders; and

10 (5) The provision of such other assistance to public defenders as may be authorized by
11 law.

12 (b) The council:

13 (1) Shall be the fiscal officer for the circuit public defender offices; and

14 (2) Shall collect, maintain, review, and publish records and statistics for the purpose of
15 evaluating the delivery of indigent defense representation in Georgia.

16 17-12-6.

17 (a) All members of the council shall at all times act in the best interest of indigent
18 defendants who are receiving legal representation under the provisions of this chapter.

19 (b) All members of the council shall be entitled to vote on any matter coming before the
20 council unless otherwise provided by law or by rules adopted by the council concerning
21 conflicts of interest.

22 (c) Each member of the council shall serve until a successor has been appointed. Removal
23 of council members shall be for cause and shall be in accordance with policies and
24 procedures adopted by the council.

25 (d) Unless otherwise provided in this article, a quorum shall be a majority of the members
26 of the council who are then in office, and decisions of the council shall be by majority vote
27 of the members present, except that a majority of the entire council must approve the
28 appointment or removal of the chairperson or removal of a circuit public defender for cause
29 pursuant to Code Section 17-12-21.

30 (e) The council shall meet at least quarterly and at such other times and places as it deems
31 necessary or convenient for the performance of its duties.

32 (f) The council shall elect a chairperson and such officers from the members of the council
33 as it deems necessary and shall adopt such rules for the transaction of its business as it
34 desires. The chairperson and officers shall serve for a term of two years and may be
35 removed without cause by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the entire council and for
36 cause by a majority vote of the entire council. The chairperson shall retain a vote on all

1 matters except those in which the chairperson has a conflict of interest or the removal of
2 the chairperson for cause. The council shall keep and maintain minutes of all council
3 meetings.

4 (g) The members of the council shall receive no compensation for their services but shall
5 be reimbursed for their actual expenses incurred in the performance of their duties as
6 members of the council. Any expenses incurred by the council shall be paid from the
7 general operating budget of the council.

8 17-12-7.

9 (a) The council shall approve the development and improvement of programs which
10 provide legal representation to indigent persons and juveniles.

11 (b) The council shall approve and implement programs, services, rules, policies,
12 procedures, regulations, and standards as may be necessary to fulfill the purposes and
13 provisions of this article and to comply with all applicable laws governing the rights of
14 indigent persons accused of violations of criminal law. Standards shall include, but shall
15 not be limited to, the following:

16 (1) Standards for maintaining and operating circuit defender offices, including
17 requirements regarding qualifications, training, and size of the legal and supporting staff
18 of such offices;

19 (2) Standards prescribing minimum experience, training, and other qualifications for
20 appointed counsel where a conflict of interest arises between the public defender and an
21 indigent person;

22 (3) Standards for assistant public defender and appointed counsel caseloads;

23 (4) Standards for the performance of assistant public defenders and appointed counsel
24 representing indigent persons;

25 (5) Standards and procedures for the appointment of independent, competent, and
26 efficient counsel for representation in both the trial and appellate courts of indigent
27 persons whose cases present conflicts of interest;

28 (6) Standards for providing and compensating experts, investigators, and other persons
29 who provide services necessary for the effective representation of indigent persons;

30 (7) Standards for qualifications and performance of counsel representing indigent
31 persons in capital cases;

32 (8) Standards for determining indigence and for assessing and collecting the costs of
33 legal representation and related services;

34 (9) Standards for compensation of attorneys appointed to represent indigent persons
35 under this article.

36 (10) Standards for removal for cause pursuant to Code Section 17-12-21;

1 (11) Standards for a uniform definition of a 'case' for purposes of determining caseload
2 statistics; and

3 (12) Standards for accepting contractual indigent defense representation.

4 17-12-8.

5 The council shall be authorized to conduct or approve for credit or reimbursement, or both,
6 basic and continuing legal education courses or other appropriate training programs for the
7 circuit public defenders or their staff members. The council, in accordance with such rules
8 as it shall adopt, shall be authorized to provide reimbursement, in whole or in part, for the
9 actual expenses incurred by any circuit public defender or their staff members in attending
10 any approved course or training program from funds as may be appropriated or otherwise
11 made available to the council. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the circuit
12 public defenders or their staff members shall be authorized to receive reimbursement for
13 actual expenses incurred in attending approved courses or training programs, provided that
14 no person shall be entitled to claim reimbursement under both this Code section and Code
15 Section 17-12-27. The council shall adopt rules governing the approval of courses and
16 training programs for credit or reimbursement as may be necessary to administer this Code
17 section properly.

18 17-12-9.

19 (a) The council shall prepare annually a report of its activities in order to provide the
20 General Assembly, the Governor, and the Supreme Court of Georgia with an accurate
21 description and accounting of the preceding year's expenditures and accomplishments.

22 (b) The council shall also provide to the General Assembly, the Governor, and the
23 Supreme Court of Georgia a detailed analysis of all grants and funds, whether public or
24 private, applied for or granted, together with how and in what manner the same are to be
25 utilized and expended.

26 17-12-10.

27 (a) On December 31, 2003, the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council shall assume
28 all powers, duties, and obligations of the Georgia Indigent Defense Council created by
29 former Code Section 17-12-32, and all references in this Code to the Georgia Indigent
30 Defense Council shall be deemed to be references to the Georgia Public Defender
31 Standards Council. Such powers shall include, without limitation, making grants and
32 distributions to the counties.

33 (b) At least 90 percent of all state appropriated funds to the former Georgia Indigent
34 Defense Council or the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council shall be distributed to

1 counties for the January 1, 2004, through December 31, 2004, time period, based upon
2 previous year expenditures for the provision of defense services at the local level.

3 (c) On December 31, 2003, the employees in good standing, assets, and resources of the
4 Georgia Indigent Defense Council shall be transferred to the Georgia Public Defender
5 Standards Council, and the council shall assume any executory contractual obligations of
6 the Georgia Indigent Defense Council, provided that allocated funding resources for such
7 obligations are also transferred. All full-time employees of the Georgia Public Defender
8 Standards Council shall be state employees in the unclassified service of the State Merit
9 System of Personnel Administration with all of the benefits of appointed state employees
10 provided by law.

11 17-12-11.

12 From January 1, 2005, through December 31, 2005, the Georgia Public Defender Standards
13 Council shall coordinate the transition from the procedures for providing criminal defense
14 to indigent persons in effect on December 31, 2004, in each county to the procedures
15 provided in Article 1 of this chapter. On and after January 1, 2005, the provisions of
16 Article 1 of this chapter shall govern the public provision of criminal defense to indigent
17 persons in the courts of this state.

18 17-12-12.

19 This article shall become effective on December 31, 2003, except as specified in Code
20 Section 17-12-3.

21 ARTICLE 2

22 17-12-20.

23 As used in this article, the term:

24 (1) 'Assistant public defender' means an attorney who is employed by any circuit public
25 defender or conflict defender office.

26 (2) 'Circuit public defender' means the head of a public defender office providing
27 indigent defense representation within any given judicial circuit of this state.

28 (3) 'Circuit public defender office' means the office of any of the several circuit public
29 defenders.

30 (4) 'Council' means the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council.

1 17-12-21.

2 (a) There is created in each judicial circuit in the state a circuit public defender selection
3 panel to be composed of five members. The membership shall be composed of one
4 member each appointed by the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the
5 House of Representatives, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Georgia, and the chief
6 judge of the superior court of the circuit. Members of the circuit public defender selection
7 panel shall be individuals with significant experience working in the criminal justice
8 system or who have demonstrated a strong commitment to the provision of adequate and
9 effective representation of indigent defendants. The circuit public defender selection panel
10 members shall serve for a term of four years. Any vacancy for an appointed member shall
11 be filled by the appointing authority.

12 (b) By majority vote of its membership, the circuit public defender selection panel shall
13 appoint the circuit public defender in the circuit as provided in this article. The first such
14 appointments shall be made to take office on January 1, 2005, for terms of four years. The
15 initial appointments shall be for a term of four years.

16 (c) A circuit public defender may be removed for cause by a majority vote of the council.

17 (d) If a vacancy occurs for the position of circuit public defender, the chief judge of the
18 superior court of the circuit shall appoint an interim circuit public defender to serve until
19 the circuit public defender selection panel has appointed a replacement to serve out the
20 unexpired term of office. The circuit public defender selection panel shall appoint a
21 replacement circuit public defender within three months of the occurring of the vacancy.

22 17-12-22.

23 To be eligible to fill the position of circuit public defender, a person must:

24 (1) Have attained the age of 25 years;

25 (2) Have been duly admitted and licensed to practice law in the superior courts for at
26 least three years;

27 (3) Be a member in good standing of the State Bar of Georgia; and

28 (4) If previously disbarred from the practice of law, have been reinstated as provided by
29 law.

30 17-12-23.

31 (a) The council shall establish a procedure for providing legal representation in cases
32 where the circuit public defender office has a conflict of interest. This procedure may be
33 by appointment of individual counsel on a case-by-case basis or by the establishment of a
34 conflict defender office in those circuits where the volume of cases may warrant a separate
35 conflict defender office.

1 (b) Lawyers who seek appointment in conflict cases must have such experience or training
2 in the defense of criminal cases as is necessary in light of the complexity of the case to
3 which they are appointed and must meet such qualifications and standards for the
4 representation of indigent defendants as are established by the council.

5 (c) The circuit public defender shall establish a method for identifying conflicts of interest
6 at the earliest possible opportunity.

7 17-12-24.

8 (a) The circuit public defender shall provide representation in the following actions and
9 proceedings:

10 (1) Any case prosecuted in a superior court under the laws of the State of Georgia in
11 which there is a possibility that a sentence of imprisonment or probation or a suspended
12 sentence of imprisonment may be adjudged;

13 (2) A hearing on a revocation of probation in a superior court;

14 (3) Any juvenile court case where the juvenile may face a disposition of confinement,
15 commitment, or probation; and

16 (4) Any direct appeal of any of the proceedings enumerated in paragraphs (1) through (3)
17 of this subsection.

18 (b) In each of the actions and proceedings enumerated in subsection (a) of this Code
19 section, entitlement to the services of counsel begins as soon as is feasible and no more
20 than 72 hours after the indigent person is taken into custody or service is made upon him
21 or her of the charge, petition, notice, or other initiating process.

22 (c) Each circuit public defender shall establish a juvenile division within the circuit public
23 defender office to specialize in the defense of juveniles.

24 (d) A city, county, or consolidated government may contract with the circuit public
25 defender office for the provision of criminal defense for indigent persons accused of
26 violating city, county, or consolidated government ordinances or state laws.

27 17-12-25.

28 (a) The council shall establish guidelines for determining the financial eligibility of
29 persons claiming indigence, and the circuit public defender and any other person or entity
30 providing indigent defense services shall use the guidelines to determine the financial
31 eligibility of any person or juvenile arrested, detained, or charged in any manner that would
32 entitle him or her to representation under this article.

33 (b) The circuit public defenders shall administer and coordinate the day-to-day operations
34 of their respective offices and shall supervise the assistant public defenders and other staff
35 serving in the office.

1 (c) The circuit public defender shall keep and maintain appropriate records, which shall
2 include the number of persons represented under this article, including cases assigned to
3 other counsel based on conflict of interest; the offenses charged; the outcome of each case;
4 the expenditures made in carrying out the duties imposed by this article; and any other
5 information requested by the council.

6 17-12-26.

7 (a) Each circuit public defender shall receive an annual salary and cost-of-living
8 adjustments from state funds as prescribed by the council.

9 (b) The county or counties comprising the judicial circuit may supplement the salary of
10 the circuit public defender in an amount as is or may be authorized by local Act or in an
11 amount as may be determined by the governing authority of the county or counties,
12 whichever is greater.

13 (c) No circuit public defender shall engage in the private practice of law for profit.

14 17-12-27.

15 (a) The council shall prepare and submit to the Judicial Council of Georgia an annual
16 proposed budget necessary for fulfilling the purposes of this article in accordance with
17 Code Section 45-12-78. The budget request shall be based on the previous year's
18 expenditures and budget requests submitted by each circuit public defender, the
19 multicounty public defender office, and the office of the mental health advocate. The
20 council is also authorized to seek, solicit, apply for, and utilize funds from any public or
21 private source to use in fulfilling the purposes of this article.

22 (b) The budget of the council shall include the budget of all circuit public defenders and
23 other offices and entities, including conflict defender offices and appointed attorneys
24 providing indigent defense representation under the authority of this article and the
25 multicounty public defender office and the office of the mental health advocate.

26 (c) The director of the Administrative Office of the Courts shall provide general
27 administrative support, which shall include purchasing, payroll, and similar administrative
28 services, to the council.

29 (d) The director of the Administrative Office of the Courts shall not reduce or modify the
30 budget of the council and may not in any manner use funds appropriated to or otherwise
31 designated for the council.

32 (e)(1) Subject to the provisions of paragraphs (3) and (4) of this subsection, expenses
33 paid by the council pursuant to this Code section shall be paid out of funds as may be
34 appropriated by the General Assembly.

1 (2) On or before June 1 of each year, the council shall establish and furnish to each
2 circuit public defender and the state auditor the travel budget for each judicial circuit
3 based on the amount appropriated by the General Assembly for travel.

4 (3) In determining the travel budget for each judicial circuit, the council shall consider
5 the budget request submitted by the circuit public defender of each judicial circuit, the
6 geographic size and the caseload of each circuit, and other facts as may be relevant. The
7 council is authorized to establish a contingency reserve of not more than 3 percent of the
8 total amount appropriated by the General Assembly in order to meet any expenses which
9 could not be reasonably anticipated. The council shall submit to each circuit public
10 defender, the state auditor, and the legislative budget analyst a monthly report showing
11 the budget amount of expenditures made under the travel budget. The council may
12 periodically review and adjust the travel budget as may be necessary to carry out the
13 purposes of this subsection.

14 (4) Neither the circuit public defender nor any personnel compensated by the state
15 pursuant to the provisions of this article shall be reimbursed from state funds for any
16 expenses for which the person has been reimbursed from funds other than state funds;
17 provided, however, that the governing authority of the county or counties comprising the
18 judicial circuit are authorized to provide travel advances or to reimburse expenses which
19 may be incurred by the person in the performance of his or her official duties to the extent
20 the expenses are not reimbursed by the state as provided in this Code section.

21 17-12-28.

22 (a) Subject to the provisions of this Code section, the circuit public defender in each
23 judicial circuit is authorized to appoint:

24 (1) One assistant public defender for each superior court judge authorized for the circuit,
25 excluding the chief judge and senior judges; and

26 (2) Subject to funds being appropriated by the General Assembly or otherwise available,
27 additional assistant public defenders as may be authorized by the council. In authorizing
28 additional assistant public defenders, the council shall consider the caseload, present staff,
29 and resources available to each circuit public defender, and shall make authorizations as
30 will contribute to the efficiency of individual circuit public defenders and the
31 effectiveness of providing adequate legal defense for indigent defendants.

32 (b) Each assistant public defender appointed pursuant to subsection (a) of this Code
33 section shall be classified based on education, training, and experience. The classes of
34 assistant public defenders and the minimum qualifications required for appointment or
35 promotion to each class shall be established by the council based on education, training,

1 and experience and in accordance with the provisions of Code Sections 17-12-31 and
2 17-12-35.

3 (c) Each assistant public defender appointed pursuant to this Code section shall be
4 compensated based on a salary schedule established in accordance with subsection (c) of
5 Code Section 17-12-31. The salary range for each class established in accordance with
6 subsection (b) of this Code section shall be as follows:

7 (1) Assistant public defender I. Not less than \$27,696.00 nor more than 65 percent of the
8 compensation of the circuit public defender;

9 (2) Assistant public defender II. Not less than \$30,552.00 nor more than 70 percent of
10 the compensation of the circuit public defender;

11 (3) Assistant public defender III. Not less than \$37,140.00 nor more than 80 percent of
12 the compensation of the circuit public defender; and

13 (4) Assistant public defender IV. Not less than \$42,966.00 nor more than 90 percent of
14 the compensation of the circuit public defender.

15 (d) All personnel actions involving attorneys appointed pursuant to this Code section shall

19 clerks as to investing or depositing funds and the manner of depositing funds paid into the
20 court registry, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

21 "15-6-76.1.

22 (a) In counties where the clerk of the superior court exercised discretion to invest funds
23 pursuant to Code Section 15-6-75 or to deposit funds in one or more interest-bearing
24 accounts pursuant to Code Section 15-6-76, and such funds were invested or on deposit on
25 January 1, 1993, the clerk may continue to invest such funds pursuant to Code Section
26 15-6-75 or deposit such funds pursuant to Code Section 15-6-76 until July 1, 1994. In such
27 counties, clerks who do not elect to continue investing or depositing funds pursuant to such
28 Code sections, or who cease depositing or investing such funds pursuant to such Code
29 sections, shall be subject to the provisions of subsections (c) through (g) of this Code
30 section. In such counties, clerks shall provide a written notice to the Georgia ~~Indigent~~
31 ~~Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards Council within 30 days following July 1,
32 1993, stating that funds were invested or on deposit pursuant to Code Section 15-6-75 or
33 15-6-76 on January 1, 1993, and stating whether they have elected to continue investing
34 or depositing funds pursuant to Code Sections 15-6-75 and 15-6-76 or to comply with the
35 provisions of subsections (c) through (g) of this Code section. In such counties, clerks may

1 change their election by written notice to the Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public

3 (b) In counties where no funds were invested or on deposit pursuant to Code Section
4 15-6-75 or 15-6-76 on January 1, 1993, clerks shall be subject to the provisions of
5 subsections (c) through (g) of this Code section, effective July 1, 1993.

6 (c) When funds are paid into the registry of the court, the clerk shall deposit such funds
7 in one or more interest-bearing trust accounts in investments authorized by Code Section
8 36-80-3 or by Chapter 83 of Title 36.

9 (d) When funds have been paid into the registry of the court pursuant to a court order
10 directing that such funds be deposited in an interest-bearing trust account for the benefit
11 of one or more of the parties, the interest received from such funds after service charges
12 or fees imposed by the bank or depository shall be paid to one or more of the parties as the
13 order of the court directs.

14 (e) When funds have been paid into the registry of the court and the order of the court
15 relating to such funds does not state that such funds shall be placed in an interest-bearing
16 trust account for the benefit of one or more of the parties, the clerk shall deposit such funds
17 in an interest-bearing trust account and the financial institution in which such funds are
18 deposited shall remit, after service charges or fees are deducted, the interest generated by
19 said funds directly, at least quarterly and within 30 days of receipt, to the Georgia ~~Indigent~~
20 ~~Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards Council for distribution to the ~~counties~~
21 ~~pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 12 of Title 17~~ circuit public defender offices. With each
22 remittance the financial institution shall send a statement showing the name of the court,
23 the rate of interest applied, the average monthly balance in the account against which the
24 interest rate is applied, the service charges or fees of the bank or other depository, and the
25 net remittance. This subsection shall include but not be limited to cash supersedeas bonds
26 for criminal appeal, other supersedeas bonds, and bonds or funds paid into the court
27 registry in actions involving interpleader, condemnation, and requests for injunctive relief.
28 The Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards Council shall allocate
29 all interest received from such funds deposited in interest-bearing trust accounts to the
30 ~~counties pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 12 of Title 17~~ circuit public defender offices.

31 (f) In its discretion, the court may at any time amend its order to require that the funds be
32 deposited into an interest-bearing account for the benefit of one or more of the parties to
33 the action, and the clerk shall comply with such amended order.

34 (g) In counties where the service charges or fees of the bank or depository would exceed
35 the interest received from funds subject to this Code section, the clerk shall be exempt from

1 subsections (a) through (f) of this Code section. In such counties, the clerk shall send a
 2 written notice to the Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards Council."

3 **SECTION 3.**

4 Said title is further amended by striking Code Section 15-7-49, relating to remittance of
 5 interest from interest-bearing trust accounts to the Georgia Indigent Defense Council, and
 6 inserting in lieu thereof the following:

7 "15-7-49.

8 When funds are paid into the court registry, the clerk shall deposit such funds in
 9 interest-bearing trust accounts and the interest from those funds shall be remitted to the
 10 Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards Council in accordance with
 11 the provisions of subsections (c) through (g) of Code Section 15-6-76.1. The Georgia
 12 ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards Council shall allocate all interest
 13 received from such funds in accordance with subsection (e) of Code Section 15-6-76.1."

14 **SECTION 4.**

15 Said title is further amended by striking Code Section 15-9-18, relating to remittance of
 16 interest from cash bonds to the Georgia Indigent Defense Council, and inserting in lieu
 17 thereof the following:

18 "15-9-18.

19 Whenever the sheriff transfers cash bonds to the clerk of the court, pursuant to Code
 20 Section 15-16-27, the clerk shall deposit such funds into interest-bearing trust accounts and
 21 the interest from those funds shall be remitted to the Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~
 22 Public Defender Standards Council in accordance with the provisions of subsections (c)
 23 through (g) of Code Section 15-6-76.1. The Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public
 24 Defender Standards Council shall allocate all interest received from such funds in
 25 accordance with subsection (e) of Code Section 15-6-76.1."

26 **SECTION 5.**

27 Said title is further amended by striking Code Section 15-10-240, relating to remittance of
 28 interest from funds to the Georgia Indigent Defense Council, and inserting in lieu thereof the
 29 following:

30 "15-10-240.

31 When funds are paid into the court registry, the clerk shall deposit such funds in
 32 interest-bearing trust accounts and the interest from those funds shall be remitted to the
 33 Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards Council in accordance with
 34 the provisions of subsections (c) through (g) of Code Section 15-6-76.1. The Georgia

1 ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards Council shall allocate all interest
2 received from such funds in accordance with subsection (e) of Code Section 15-6-76.1."

3 SECTION 6.

4 Said title is further amended by striking Code Section 15-16-27, relating to deposit by sheriff
5 of cash bonds and reserves of professional bondspersons in interest-bearing accounts and
6 disposition of interest, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

7 "15-16-27.

8 (a) Unless transferred to the appropriate clerk of court, the sheriff shall deposit cash bonds
9 held by the sheriff in one or more interest-bearing trust accounts in investments authorized
10 by Code Section 36-80-3 or by Chapter 83 of Title 36.

11 (b) The financial institution in which the funds are deposited shall remit, after service
12 charges or fees are deducted, the interest generated by such funds directly, at least quarterly
13 and within 30 days of receipt, to the Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public Defender
14 Standards Council for distribution to the ~~counties pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 12 of~~
15 ~~Title 17~~ circuit public defender offices. With each remittance the financial institution shall
16 send a statement showing the name of the county, deposits and withdrawals from the
17 account or accounts, interest paid, service charges or fees of the bank or other depository,
18 and the net remittance. The Georgia ~~Indigent Defense Council~~ Public Defender Standards
19 Council shall allocate all interest received from such funds deposited in interest-bearing

22 (c) In counties where the service charges or fees of the bank or depository would exceed
23 the interest received from funds subject to this Code section, the sheriff shall be exempt
24 from subsections (a) and (b) of this Code section. In such counties, the sheriff shall send

26 Council."

27 SECTION 7.

28 Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to crimes and offenses, is
29 amended by striking division (u)(4)(D)(iv) of Code Section 16-13-49, relating to forfeitures,
30 and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

31 "(iv) Money distributed to the state pursuant to this subsection shall be paid into the
32 general fund of the state treasury, it being the intent of the General Assembly that the
33 same be used, subject to appropriation from the general fund in the manner provided
34 by law, ~~for funding of Article 2 of Chapter 12 of Title 17, 'The Georgia Indigent~~
35 ~~Defense Act,'~~ for representation of indigents in criminal cases; for funding of the

1 Crime Victims Emergency Fund; for law enforcement and prosecution agency
 2 programs and particularly for funding of advanced drug investigation and prosecution
 3 training for law enforcement officers and prosecuting attorneys; for drug treatment,
 4 rehabilitation, prevention, or education or any other program which responds to
 5 problems created by drug or substance abuse; for use as matching funds for grant
 6 programs related to drug treatment or prevention; or for financing the judicial system
 7 of the state."

8 SECTION 8.

9 Title 35 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to law enforcement officers and
 10 agencies, is amended by striking Code Section 35-6A-3, relating to membership on the
 11 Criminal Justice Coordinating Council, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

12 "35-6A-3.

13 (a) The Criminal Justice Coordinating Council shall consist of 24 members and shall be
 14 composed as follows:

15 (1) The ~~chairman~~ chairperson of the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training
 16 Council, the ~~chairman~~ chairperson of the Georgia Organized Crime Prevention Council,
 17 the ~~chairman~~ chairperson of the Judicial Council of Georgia, the ~~chairman~~ chairperson
 18 of the Prosecuting Attorneys' Council of the State of Georgia, the commissioner of
 19 corrections, the ~~chairman~~ chairperson of the Board of Corrections, the ~~vice-chairman~~ vice
 20 chairperson of the Board of Public Safety, the chairman of the State Board of Pardons and
 21 Paroles, the State School Superintendent, the commissioner of community affairs, the
 22 president of the Council of Juvenile Court Judges, the ~~director of the Georgia Indigent~~
 23 ~~Defense Council~~ chairperson of the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council, the
 24 ~~chairman~~ chairperson of the Children and Youth Coordinating Council, and the
 25 commissioner of juvenile justice or their designees shall be ex officio members of the
 26 council, as full voting members of the council by reason of their office; and

27 (2) Ten members shall be appointed by the Governor for terms of four years, their initial
 28 appointments, however, being four for four-year terms, two for three-year terms, and four
 29 for two-year terms. Appointments shall be made so that there are always on the council
 30 the following persons: one county sheriff, one chief of police, one mayor, one county
 31 commissioner, one superior court judge, four individuals who shall be, by virtue of their
 32 training or experience, knowledgeable in the operations of the criminal justice system of
 33 this state, and one individual who shall be, by virtue of his or her training and experience,
 34 knowledgeable in the operations of the entire spectrum of crime victim assistance
 35 programs delivering services to victims of crime. No person shall serve beyond the time

1 he or she holds the office or employment by reason of which he or she was initially
2 eligible for appointment.

3 (b) In the event of death, resignation, disqualification, or removal for any reason of any
4 member of the council, vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original
5 appointment and successors shall serve for the unexpired term.

6 (c) The initial terms for all 19 original members shall begin July 1, 1981. The initial term
7 for the member added in 1985 shall begin July 1, 1985. The initial term for the member
8 added in 1988 shall begin July 1, 1988. The initial term for the member added in 1989
9 shall begin July 1, 1989. The State School Superintendent shall be a member effective on
10 July 1, 1989. ~~The director of the Georgia Indigent Defense Council shall be a member~~
11 ~~effective on July 1, 1997~~ chairperson of the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council
12 shall become a member on December 31, 2003.

13 (d) Membership on the council does not constitute public office, and no member shall be
14 disqualified from holding public office by reason of his or her membership."

15 SECTION 9.

16 Code Section 36-32-1 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the
17 establishment of municipal courts, punishments, and the selection, election, or appointment
18 of the mayor pro tempore or recorder pro tempore, is amended by inserting at the end thereof
19 new subsections (f), (g), and (h) to read as follows:

20 "(f) Any municipal court operating within this state and having jurisdiction over the
21 violation of municipal ordinances and over such other matters as are by specific or general
22 law made subject to the jurisdiction of municipal courts shall not impose any punishment
23 of confinement, probation, or other loss of liberty, or impose any fine, fee, or cost
24 enforceable by confinement, probation, or other loss of liberty, as authorized by general
25 law or municipal or county ordinance, unless the court provides to the accused the right to
26 representation by a lawyer, and provides to those accused who are indigent the right to
27 counsel at no cost to the accused. Such representation shall be subject to all applicable
28 standards adopted by the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council for representation of
29 indigent persons in this state.

30 (g) Any municipal court operating within this state that has jurisdiction over the violation
31 of municipal or county ordinances or such other statutes as are by specific or general law
32 made subject to the jurisdiction of municipal courts, and that holds committal hearings in
33 regard to such alleged violations, must provide to the accused the right to representation
34 by a lawyer, and must provide to those accused who are indigent the right to counsel at no
35 cost to the accused. Such representation shall be subject to all applicable standards adopted

1 by the Georgia Public Defender Standards Council for representation of indigent persons
2 in this state.

3 (h) Any municipality or municipal court may contract with the office of the circuit public
4 defender of the judicial circuit in which such municipality is located as a means of
5 complying with the municipality's or municipal court's legal obligation to provide defense
6 counsel at no cost to indigent persons appearing before the court in relation to violations
7 of municipal ordinances, county ordinances, or state laws."

8 **SECTION 10.**

9 (a) Section 1 of this Act shall become effective as set forth in said section.

10 (b) Sections 2 through 8 of this Act shall become effective on December 31, 2003.

11 (c) Section 9 of this Act shall become effective on January 1, 2005.

12 (d) This section and Section 11 of this Act shall become effective on July 1, 2003.

13 **SECTION 11.**

14 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
