A RESOLUTION

- 1 Expressing regret at the passing of Mr. Cecil McClure; and for other purposes.
- 2 WHEREAS, the State of Georgia recently lost one of its finest and most distinguished
3 citizens with the passing of Mr. Cecil McClure at the age of 75; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Mr. McClure was a native of Forsyth County, Georgia, and he attended
5 Cumming High School and served in the Army during the Second World War in the Pacific
6 theater, after which he attended John Marshal Law School; and
- 7 WHEREAS, he became clerk of the Superior Court of Forsyth County on June 1, 1962, and
8 retired from that office on December 31, 1996; and
- 9 WHEREAS, he was actively involved in the civic, religious, and charitable affairs of his
10 community and gave unstintingly and unceasingly of his time, talents, and energy to improve
11 the quality of life in his community; and
- 12 WHEREAS, his unparalleled organizational and leadership talents, his remarkable patience
13 and diplomacy, his keen sense of vision, and his acute sensitivity to the needs of the citizens
14 of his community earned him the respect and admiration of his colleagues and associates; and
- 15 WHEREAS, the untimely passing of this generous, unselfish, and devoted family man leaves
16 an unfillable void in the hearts and lives of his family and friends; and
- 17 WHEREAS, he is survived by his wife of 55 years, Mary Heard McClure, two sons, Harley
18 and Steve McClure, two daughters, Cecilia Fowler and Sally Woods, numerous
19 grandchildren, and numerous other family and friends.

1 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body
2 express their deepest and most sincere regret at the passing of Mr. Cecil McClure and convey
3 condolences to his grieving family and friends.
