A RESOLUTION

1 Recognizing and commending the Georgia Association, Family, Career and Community
2 Leaders of America; and for other purposes.

3 WHEREAS, Family, Career and Community Leaders of America is the national student
4 organization that helps young men and women become leaders and address important
5 personal, family, work, and societal issues through family and consumer sciences education;
6 and

7 WHEREAS, FCCLA is the only student organization operating through the nation's schools
8 with the family as its central focus; and

9 WHEREAS, the organization extends classroom learning through chapter projects that
10 develop initiative and teach students to plan, set goals, solve problems, and make decisions;

12 WHEREAS, FCCLA helps youth develop skills for life through character development,
13 creative and critical thinking, interpersonal communication, practical knowledge, and
14 vocational preparation; and

15 WHEREAS, Family, Career and Community Leaders of America members learn
16 cooperation, take responsibility, develop leadership, and give service; and

17 WHEREAS, Georgia Association, FCCLA, has more than 21,000 student members, making
18 it the largest state association and third largest in the United States; and

19 WHEREAS, Georgia FCCLA members work together for the improvement of themselves,
20 their families, communities, and the state.

1 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that this body recognizes the
2 Georgia Association, Family, Career and Community Leaders of America for making the
3 family its central focus and commends all its members for their many achievements.

4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body encourages all citizens to acquaint themselves
5 with the activities and values of Georgia FCCLA, to show interest in it, and give help and
6 encouragement to these young men and women who are working to achieve knowledge and
7 experience that will help prepare them for future responsibilities as active and concerned
