# A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

To amend Chapters 2 and 3 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating 1 2 to elementary and secondary education and to postsecondary education, respectively, so as 3 to change the reporting system and method for determining eligibility for HOPE 4 scholarships, other scholarships, grants, or loan assistance, and certain postsecondary courses 5 and advanced placement courses for students enrolling as freshmen in eligible public or private postsecondary institutions on or after May 1, 2007; to delete an obsolete reference; 6 to provide for loss of eligibility for the HOPE scholarship for any student who does not 7 8 possess at least a cumulative 3.0 grade point average at the end of each spring quarter or 9 semester; to provide for restoration of such eligibility; to provide for a set amount for 10 mandatory fees for HOPE scholarships and HOPE grants; to provide for a limitation on 11 quarter hours or semester hours of eligibility for HOPE grants and eligibility for combined 12 HOPE scholarships and grants; to provide for exceptions; to create the HOPE 13 Scholarship/Pre-K Legislative Oversight Committee; to provide for membership and duties 14 of such oversight committee; to amend Code Section 50-27-13 of the Official Code of 15 Georgia Annotated, relating to disposition of lottery proceeds, budget report by Governor, 16 appropriations by General Assembly, and shortfall reserve subaccount, so as to provide for 17 changes to the amount of book allowances for a HOPE scholarship or grant under certain conditions; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes. 18

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## BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

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#### **SECTION 1.**

21 Chapter 2 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to elementary and

22 secondary education, is amended by striking Code Section 20-2-157, relating to the uniform reporting system for specified purposes, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

(a) It is the intent of the General Assembly to establish a uniform reporting system to be 25 used as one of the criteria to determine eligibility of students seeking enrollment in 26

postsecondary courses pursuant to Code Section 20-2-161.1 or seeking educational
 scholarships, grants, or loan assistance administered by the Georgia Student Finance
 Commission pursuant to Article 7 of Chapter 3 of this title.

(b) <u>Beginning May 1, 2007, each Each school system and private school shall adopt the</u>
following reporting system <u>described in this subsection</u> for purposes of identifying and
qualifying graduating seniors for the HOPE scholarship program and other programs
identified in this Code section:

8 (1) A final grade average of at least an 80 numeric average, provided the student meets 9 the college preparatory curriculum requirements Each school system and private school 10 shall transmit, in a manner and at times prescribed by the Georgia Student Finance Commission, an electronic transcript of courses and course grades for each graduating 11 12 senior that reflects the complete high school academic record of the student, including 13 scores on any state tests required for graduation, the grading scales used by the school system or private school for the time periods referenced by the transcripts, and any other 14 15 pertinent information as determined by the Georgia Student Finance Commission. Each 16 grade reported by a school system or private school to the commission for the purpose of calculating the grade point average for HOPE scholarship eligibility shall be the actual 17 18 grade earned by the student, with no weighting or addition of points by the local school 19 system or private school;

(2) A final grade average of at least an 85 numeric average, if the student meets the
 career/technical curriculum requirements <u>The Georgia Student Finance Commission shall</u>
 calculate a grade point average for the purpose of determining eligibility for the HOPE
 scholarship from these electronic transcripts and shall notify students of their eligibility
 and high schools as to the eligibility of students;

(3) For students graduating from high school in 2000 or thereafter, a final grade average
of at least an 80 numeric average in their core curriculum subjects, provided that the
student meets the college preparatory curriculum requirements For students otherwise
qualified and enrolling as freshmen students in eligible public or private postsecondary
institutions for the first time on May 1, 2007, or thereafter, the Georgia Student Finance
Commission shall calculate grade point averages for determining eligibility for the HOPE
scholarship and other scholarships referenced in this Code section as follows:

32 (A) For students receiving a college preparatory diploma, each grade for a student in
 33 attempted coursework in English, mathematics, science, social studies, and foreign
 34 language that would, if successfully completed, satisfy a core graduation requirement
 35 for the college preparatory curriculum shall be equated to a grade on a 4.0 scale, such
 36 that a grade of 'A' = 4.0, a grade of 'B' = 3.0, a grade of 'C' = 2.0, a grade of 'D' = 1.0,
 37 and a grade of 'F' = 0; or

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1	(B) For students receiving a career/technical diploma, each grade for a student in
2	attempted coursework in English, mathematics, science, and social studies that would,
3	if successfully completed, satisfy a core graduation requirement for the career/technical

6	Grades for coursework that is classified as advanced placement or international
7	baccalaureate shall be weighted by the Georgia Student Finance Commission in
8	calculating the overall grade point averages for students, provided that the weighting of
9	such course grades is uniformly applied to all students in the state taking the specified
10	coursework. The sum of the equated grades shall be divided by the number of course
11	grades, adjusted for term length, to yield a grade point average on a 4.0 scale; or
12	(4) For students graduating from high school in 2000 or thereafter, a final grade average
13	of at least an 85 numeric average in their core curriculum subjects if the student meets the
14	career/technical curriculum requirements. Qualification for the HOPE scholarship shall
15	be determined from the grade point average calculated as set out in paragraph (3) of this
16	subsection. Beginning May 1, 2007, students with grade point averages equal to or in
17	excess of 3.0 on the 4.0 scale with a college preparatory diploma shall meet achievement
18	standards for the HOPE scholarship; students receiving a career/technical diploma shall
19	meet achievement standards for the HOPE scholarship with a grade point average equal
20	to or in excess of 3.2 on a 4.0 scale. This paragraph shall apply regardless of when a
21	student graduated from high school and regardless of such student's eligibility status prior
22	to May 1, 2007; and
23	(5) Beginning May 1, 2007, only Only the reporting system as indicated in this
24	subsection shall be used to determine eligibility for all grants, scholarships, or loans to
25	attend colleges or universities which are administered pursuant to Article 7 of Chapter
26	3 of this title and eligibility for enrollment in postsecondary courses pursuant to Code
27	Section 20-2-161.1.
28	(c)(1) Prior to May 1, 2007, each school system shall adopt the following reporting
29	system for purposes of identifying and qualifying graduating seniors for the HOPE
30	scholarship program and other programs identified in this Code section:
31	(A) A final grade average of at least an 80 numeric average in their core curriculum
32	subjects, provided that the student meets the college preparatory curriculum
33	requirements; or
34	(B) A final grade average of at least an 85 numeric average in their core curriculum
35	subjects if the student meets the career/technical curriculum requirements.
36	(2) Prior to May 1, 2007, only the reporting system as indicated in this subsection shall
37	be used to determine eligibility for all grants, scholarships, or loans to attend colleges or

2 <u>eligibility for enrollment in postsecondary courses pursuant to Code Section 20-2-161.1.</u>"

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#### **SECTION 2.**

Chapter 3 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to postsecondary

definitions relative to HOPE scholarships and grants, and inserting in lieu thereof the
following:

1 (b) A student who received the HOPE grant at a private postsecondary institution for at

2 least one semester or quarter beginning with the summer term of 1995 through the spring

3 term of 1997 is not eligible for the HOPE scholarship at an eligible postsecondary

4 institution until a quarter or semester beginning with or after the summer term of 1999.

5 <u>Reserved.</u>"

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## **SECTION 6.**

7 Said chapter is further amended by striking Code Section 20-3-519.5, relating to eligibility

8 for HOPE grants, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

9 "20-3-519.5.

10 (a) To be eligible for a HOPE grant, a student seeking a diploma or certificate at a branch

of the Georgia Department of Technical and Adult Education or a unit of the UniversitySystem of Georgia shall:

(1) Meet residency requirements by meeting the requirements to be classified as a legal
resident of Georgia as established by the program promulgated by the Georgia Student
Finance Commission which shall be based upon the in-state tuition policy of the board
of regents and the in-state tuition guidelines set by the Department of Technical and
Adult Education; and

18 (2) Meet enrollment standards by being admitted, enrolled, and classified as an 19 undergraduate student in a matriculated status in a program of study leading to a 20 certificate or diploma and maintaining satisfactory academic progress in accordance with 21 the standards and practices used for federal Title IV programs by the institution at which 22 the student is enrolled.

(b) There is no minimum number of hours of enrollment required for eligibility for aHOPE grant under this Code section.

(c) <u>Subject to the provisions of subsection (e) of this Code section, an</u> An eligible student
 may receive HOPE grants for all course work required by the institution for programs of
 study leading to a certificate or diploma, including remedial or developmental studies.

(d)(1) Subject to the amounts appropriated by the General Assembly and provisions
relating to the scholarship shortfall reserve subaccount Lottery for Education Account in
Code Section 50-27-13, a HOPE grant awarded under this Code section shall include
tuition, approved mandatory fees, and a book allowance not to exceed \$100.00 per
quarter or \$150.00 per semester, except as otherwise provided for in paragraph (2) of this
<u>subsection</u>.

# 34 (2) Effective September 1, 2004, the amount of mandatory fees paid shall be equal to 35 such amount or amounts that were paid on January 1, 2004.

- (e) No student may receive HOPE grants for more than 95 quarter hours or 63 semester
   hours of attempted coursework, except as provided for in subsection (f) of this Code
   section. No student may receive more than a cumulative total of 190 quarter hours or 127
   semester hours of combined HOPE scholarships and grants, unless in accordance with
- 5 <u>Code Sections 20-3-519.2 and 20-3-519.3.</u>
- 6 (f) A student enrolled in a diploma program designed to be more than 95 quarter hours or
- 7 <u>63 semester hours in length is eligible to receive a HOPE grant for the lesser of:</u>
- 8 (1) A total of 130 attempted quarter hours or 86 attempted semester hours; or
- 9 (2) The number of hours required for graduation."

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### **SECTION 7.**

11 Said chapter is further amended by adding a new Code section to read as follows:

12 "20-3-519.13.

There is created as a joint committee of the General Assembly the HOPE 13 (a) Scholarship/Pre-K Legislative Oversight Committee, to be composed of three members of 14 the House Committee on Higher Education and three members of the House Committee 15 16 on Education, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and three 17 members of the Senate Higher Education Committee and three members of the Senate 18 Education Committee, to be appointed by the President of the Senate. The Speaker of the 19 House of Representatives shall appoint a cochairperson from the House members appointed 20 and the President of the Senate shall appoint a cochairperson from among the Senate 21 members appointed. The oversight committee shall study, inquire into, and review the operations of the Georgia Student Finance Commission with respect to the administration 22 23 of HOPE scholarships and grants under this part, as well as review and evaluate the 24 conditions, needs, and issues of the HOPE scholarship and grant program as provided for 25 under this part, Georgia's Pre-K program, and any other programs that receive funds from 26 the Lottery for Education Account, as provided for in Article 1 of Chapter 27 of Title 50. Such study and review shall be conducted during the first year of each biennium of the 27 28 General Assembly so as to determine whether any legislative action may be necessary. The 29 oversight committee may conduct any independent audit or investigation of the commission or any other appropriate agency it deems necessary. 30

(b) The Georgia Student Finance Commission shall provide the oversight committee not
later than December 1 of each year with a complete report of the HOPE scholarship and
grant program."

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#### **SECTION 8.**

2 Code Section 50-27-13 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to disposition of 3 lottery proceeds, budget report by the Governor, appropriations by the General Assembly, 4 and the shortfall reserve subaccount, is amended by striking paragraph (3) of subsection (b) 5 and inserting a new paragraph (3) and by inserting a new paragraph (5) of subsection (b) to 6 read as follows:

7 "(3) A scholarship shortfall reserve subaccount shall be maintained within the Lottery 8 for Education Account. An amount equal to 10 percent of the total amount of lottery 9 proceeds disbursed during the preceding fiscal year in the form of scholarships and grants 10 for higher education shall be deposited from lottery proceeds each year until such amount equals 50 percent of such sum. Thereafter, only an amount necessary to maintain the 11 12 scholarship shortfall reserve subaccount in an amount equal to 50 percent of the amount 13 of lottery proceeds disbursed during the preceding fiscal year shall be deposited into the 14 subaccount. If the net proceeds paid into the Lottery for Education Account in any year 15 are not sufficient to meet the amount appropriated for higher education scholarships, the 16 shortfall reserve subaccount may be drawn upon to meet the deficiency. In the event it 17 becomes necessary to draw from the reserve subaccount in any fiscal year, the 18 scholarship program shall be reviewed and shall be reduced to accommodate available 19 lottery proceeds, exclusive of the scholarship shortfall reserve subaccount, through such 20 methods as reducing the family income cap qualification, reducing or eliminating grants 21 for student fees and books and reducing the academic years funded."

- 22 "(5)(A) For purposes of this subsection, the term 'year-end balance' shall mean the amount, as determined by the state auditor, of unexpended and uncommitted funds in 23 the Lottery for Education Account at the end of a fiscal year, which shall not include 24 25 amounts contained in the subaccounts provided for in paragraphs (3) and (4) of this 26 subsection.
- (B) In the event that the year-end balance of a fiscal year is less than the year-end 27 28 balance of the fiscal year immediately preceding, then all scholarships and grants for 29 book allowances under Part 7 of Article 7 of Chapter 3 of Title 20, except as provided for in subparagraph (C), shall not exceed \$200.00 per year beginning in the subsequent 30 31 fiscal year and thereafter. In the event that the year-end balance of any subsequent fiscal year is less than the year-end balance of the fiscal year immediately preceding, then all 32 scholarships and grants for book allowances under Part 7 of Article 7 of Chapter 3 of 33 Title 20, except as provided for in subparagraph (C), shall not exceed \$100.00 per year 34 beginning in the next fiscal year and thereafter. In the event that the year-end balance 35 of any further subsequent fiscal year is less than the year-end balance of the fiscal year 36 37 immediately preceding, then all scholarships and grants for book allowances under Part

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- 1 <u>7 of Article 7 of Chapter 3 of Title 20, except as provided for in subparagraph (C), shall</u>
- 2 <u>be eliminated beginning in the next fiscal year and thereafter.</u>
- 3 (C) This paragraph shall not apply to students who are eligible to participate in the
- 4 <u>federal Pell Grant program.</u>"

## **SECTION 9.**

6 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
