A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

1 To amend the following provisions of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, so as to
 2 change all references to "911" emergency numbers to read 9-1-1; Article 2 of Chapter 10 of
 3 Title 20, relating to obstruction of public administration; Article 2 of Chapter 5 of Title 46,
 4 relating to telephone service; Code Section 19-13-51, relating to definitions relative to the
 5 "Family Violence and Stalking Protective Order Registry Act,"; Code Section 31-11-1,
 6 relating to findings and declaration of policy relative to emergency services; Code Section
 7 33-9-39, relating to restrictions on motor vehicle insurance surcharges relating to accidents
 8 involving law enforcement officers, firefighters, or emergency medical technicians; Code
 9 Section 36-60-19, relating to dispatch centers, required training for communications officers,
 10 exceptions, and penalty for noncompliance; Code Section 38-3-20, relating to presentment
 11 of boundary dispute by grand jury, certification to Governor, appointment of surveyor to
 12 define line, and return of survey and plat to Secretary of State; Code Section 38-3-27,
 13 relating to local organizations for emergency management, creation, structure, powers,
 14 directors, appointment, qualifications, and compensation, state to provide financial
 15 assistance, and entitlement for funding; and Code Section 50-18-72, relating to when public
 16 disclosure not required and disclosure of exempting legal authority; to amend Article 2 of
 17 Chapter 5 of Title 46, relating to telephone service, so as to define certain terms; to change
 18 references to "911" numbers to read 9-1-1; to change the membership of the 9-1-1 Advisory
 19 Committee; to provide for the update of information in a certain report; to provide a penalty;
 20 to provide for the use of a wireless customer's place of primary use; to provide for a
 21 maximum administrative fee; to provide for the administration of certain funds; to provide
 22 for the recovery of costs; to provide for a state plan governing 911 enhanced systems; to
 23 provide for a reporting of the expenditure of funds; to amend Part 1 of Article 1 of Chapter
 24 8 of Title 48 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to general provisions
 25 relative to sales and use tax, so as to define certain terms; to provide for a method of making
 26 a notification of billing error; to provide for the identification of the place of primary use for
 27 wireless customers; to provide for the provision of certain customer information to certain
 28 state agencies; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

H. B. 470 (SUB)

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

2 **SECTION 1.**

3 Article 2 of Chapter 10 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
4 obstruction of public administration and related offenses, is amended by striking in its
5 entirety Code Section 16-10-24.3, relating to obstructing or hindering persons making
6 emergency telephone calls, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

7 "16-10-24.3.

8 Any person who verbally or physically obstructs, prevents, or hinders another person with
9 intent to cause or allow physical harm or injury to another person from making or
10 completing a ~~911~~ 9-1-1 telephone call or a call to any law enforcement agency to request
11 police protection or to report the commission of a crime is guilty of a misdemeanor and
12 shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not to exceed \$1,000.00 or
13 imprisonment not to exceed 12 months, or both."

14 **SECTION 2.**

15 Code Section 19-13-51 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to definitions
16 relative to the "Family Violence and Stalking Protective Order Registry Act," is amended by
17 striking in its entirety paragraph (4) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

18 "(4) 'Law enforcement officer' means any agent or officer of this state, or a political
19 subdivision or municipality thereof, who, as a full-time or part-time employee, is vested
20 either expressly by law or by virtue of public employment or service with authority to
21 enforce the criminal or traffic laws and whose duties include the preservation of public
22 order, the protection of life and property, or the prevention, detection, or investigation of
23 crime. Such term also includes the following: state or local officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff,
24 dispatcher, ~~911~~ 9-1-1 operator, police officer, prosecuting attorney, member of the State
25 Board of Pardons and Paroles, a hearing officer and parole officer of the State Board of
26 Pardons and Paroles, and a probation officer of the Department of Corrections."

27 **SECTION 3.**

28 Code Section 31-11-1 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to 31-11-1,
29 findings and declaration of policy relative to emergency services, is amended by striking in
30 its entirety paragraph (4) of subsection (a) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

31 "(a)(4) That the administration of an emergency medical systems communications
32 program should be the responsibility of the Department of Human Resources, acting upon
33 the recommendations of the local entity which coordinates the program; all ambulance

1 services shall be a part of this system even if this system is the ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 emergency
2 telephone number;"

3 **SECTION 4.**

4 Code Section 31-11-53.1 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to automated
5 external defibrillator program, establishment, regulations, and liability, is amended by
6 striking in its entirety paragraph (3) of subsection (b) and inserting in lieu thereof the
7 following:

8 "(b)(3) All persons who use an automated external defibrillator shall activate the
9 emergency medical services system as soon as reasonably possible by calling ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1
10 or the appropriate emergency telephone number upon use of the automated external
11 defibrillator; and"

12 **SECTION 5.**

13 Code Section 33-9-39 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to restrictions on
14 motor vehicle insurance surcharges relating to accidents involving law enforcement officers,
15 firefighters, or emergency medical technicians, is amended by striking in its entirety
16 paragraph (2) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

17 "(2) For which the law enforcement officer, firefighter, or emergency medical technician
18 furnishes proof, in the form of copies of the accident report, ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 emergency
19 dispatch log, or the employing agency's documents, to the insurer of the condition
20 provided in paragraph (1) of this Code section."

21 **SECTION 6.**

22 Code Section 36-60-19 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to dispatch
23 centers, required training for communications officers, exceptions, and penalty for
24 noncompliance, is amended by striking in its entirety subsection (b) and inserting in lieu
25 thereof the following:

26 "(b) On and after January 1, 1999, no monthly ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 charge provided for in Code
27 Section 46-5-133 may be imposed for the support of any dispatch center unless such
28 dispatch center is in compliance with the requirements of this Code section."

29 **SECTION 7.**

30 Code Section 38-3-20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the creation of
31 the Georgia Emergency Management Agency, director, staff, offices, director's duties, and
32 disaster coordinator, is amended by striking subsections (c) and (e) and inserting in lieu
33 thereof, respectively, the following:

1 "(c) The director may employ such professional, technical, clerical, stenographic, and other
 2 personnel, may fix their compensation, and may make such expenditures within the
 3 appropriation therefor, or from other funds made available for purposes of emergency
 4 management, as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of Article 1, this article, and
 5 Article 3 of this chapter, the duties of the agency and the director described in Part 4 of
 6 Article 2 of Chapter 5 of Title 46, the 'Georgia Emergency Telephone Number "911" 9-1-1
 7 Service Act of 1977,' as amended."

8 "(e) The director, subject to the direction and control of the Governor, shall be the
 9 executive head of the Georgia Emergency Management Agency and shall be responsible
 10 to the Governor for carrying out the program for emergency management in this state. He
 11 or she shall coordinate the activities of all organizations for emergency management within
 12 the state, shall maintain liaison with and cooperate with emergency management agencies
 13 and organizations of other states and of the federal government, and shall have such
 14 additional authority, duties, and responsibilities authorized by Article 1, this article, and
 15 Article 3 of this chapter as may be prescribed by the Governor and such additional
 16 authority, duties, and responsibilities as described in Part 4 of Article 2 of Chapter 5 of
 17 Title 46, the 'Georgia Emergency Telephone Number "911" 9-1-1 Service Act of 1977,' as
 18 amended."

19 SECTION 8.

20 Code Section 38-3-27 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to local
 21 organizations for emergency management, creation, structure, powers, directors,
 22 appointment, qualifications, compensation, state to provide financial assistance, and
 23 entitlement for funding, is amended by striking in its entirety paragraph (5) of subsection (a)
 24 and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

25 "(a)(5) The political subdivision shall designate an office in a building owned or leased
 26 by the political subdivision as the office of emergency management. Such office of
 27 emergency management shall have appropriate equipment and supplies, including but not
 28 limited to telephone and communication equipment, ~~connections~~ access to the '911' 9-1-1
 29 system if such system is operational in the political subdivision, desks, typewriters, file
 30 cabinets, and necessary office supplies. No such equipment or supplies shall be used for
 31 personal business. The local director shall post on the front door of the office the schedule
 32 of hours of the work week in which he will be attending to emergency management
 33 matters. The citizens of a political subdivision shall have accessibility to the office of
 34 emergency management and the local director or his designee shall be available or on call
 35 at all times beyond working hours."

SECTION 9.

Article 2 of Chapter 5 of Title 46 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to telephone service is amended by striking in its entirety Part 4, the "Georgia Emergency Telephone Number '911' Service Act of 1977," and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Part 4

46-5-120.

This part shall be known and may be cited as the 'Georgia Emergency Telephone Number ~~"911"~~ 9-1-1 Service Act of 1977.'

46-5-121.

(a) The General Assembly finds and declares that it is in the public interest to shorten the time required for a citizen to request and receive emergency aid. There currently exist numerous different emergency phone numbers throughout the state. Provision for a single, primary three-digit emergency number through which emergency services can be quickly and efficiently obtained would provide a significant contribution to law enforcement and other public service efforts by making it easier to notify public safety personnel. Such a simplified means of procuring emergency services will result in the saving of lives, a reduction in the destruction of property, and quicker apprehension of criminals. It is the intent of the General Assembly to establish and implement a cohesive state-wide emergency telephone number ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 system which will provide citizens with rapid, direct access to public safety agencies by dialing telephone number ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 with the objective of reducing the response time to situations requiring law enforcement, fire, medical, rescue, and other emergency services.

(b) The General Assembly further finds and declares that the benefits of ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 service should be widely available, regardless of whether a ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 call is placed from a traditional landline telephone or from a wireless telephone. It is also in the public interest that users of wireless telephones should bear some of the cost of providing this life-saving service, as users of landline telephones currently do. It is the intent of the General Assembly to bring wireless telephone service within the scope of this part and to establish a means by which local public safety agencies may provide enhanced ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 service to wireless telephone users.

46-5-122.

As used in this part, the term:

1 (1) 'Addressing' means the assigning of a numerical address and street name (the name
2 may be numerical) to each location within a local government's geographical area
3 necessary to provide public safety service as determined by the local government. This
4 address replaces any route and box number currently in place in the '911' 9-1-1 data base
5 and facilitates quicker response by public safety agencies.

6 ~~(1.1)~~(2) 'Agency' means the Georgia Emergency Management Agency established
7 pursuant to Code Section 38-3-20 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

8 ~~(2)~~(3) 'Director' means the director of emergency management appointed pursuant to
9 Code Section 38-3-20.

10 (4) 'Cost recovery' means the mechanism by which service suppliers may recover the
11 recurring and nonrecurring costs they expend on the implementation of wireless 9-1-1
12 services.

13 ~~(3)~~(5) 'Emergency "911" 9-1-1 system' means a local exchange telephone service or
14 wireless service which facilitates the placing of calls by persons in need of emergency
15 services to a public safety answering point by dialing the telephone number '911' 9-1-1
16 and under which calls to '911' 9-1-1 are answered by public safety answering points
17 established and operated by the local government subscribing to the '911' 9-1-1 service.
18 The term 'emergency "911" 9-1-1 system' also includes 'enhanced "911" 9-1-1 service,'
19 which means an emergency telephone system that provides the caller with emergency
20 '911' 9-1-1 system service and, in addition, directs '911' 9-1-1 calls to appropriate public
21 safety answering points by selective routing based on the geographical location from
22 which the call originated and provides the capability for automatic number identification
23 and automatic location identification features.

24 (6) 'Enhanced ZIP code' means a United States postal ZIP code of 9 or more digits.

25 ~~(4)~~(7) 'Exchange access facility' means the access from a particular telephone
26 subscriber's premises to the telephone system of a service supplier. Exchange access
27 facilities include service supplier provided access lines, PBX trunks, and Centrex network
28 access registers, all as defined by tariffs of the telephone companies as approved by the
29 Georgia Public Service Commission. Exchange access facilities do not include service
30 supplier owned and operated telephone pay station lines, Wide Area Telecommunications
31 Services (WATS), Foreign Exchange (FX), or incoming only lines.

32 (8) 'FIPS' means the Federal Information Processing Standard (FIPS) 55-3 or any future
33 enhancement.

34 ~~(5)~~(9) 'Local government' means any city, county, military base, or political subdivision
35 of Georgia and its agencies.

1 (10) 'Mobile telecommunications service' means commercial mobile radio service, as
 2 such term is defined in 47 C.F.R. Section 20.3 as in effect on June 1, 1999, or as
 3 subsequently amended.

4 ~~(6)~~(11) "'911" 9-1-1 charge' means a contribution to the local government for the '911'
 5 9-1-1 service start-up equipment costs, subscriber notification costs, addressing costs,
 6 billing costs, nonrecurring and recurring installation, maintenance, service, and network
 7 charges of a service supplier providing '911' 9-1-1 service pursuant to this part, and costs
 8 associated with the hiring, training, and compensating of dispatchers employed by the
 9 local government to operate said '911' 9-1-1 system at the public safety answering points.

10 (12) 'Place of primary use' means the street address representative of where the
 11 customer's use of the mobile telecommunications service primarily occurs, which must
 12 be the residential street address or the primary business street address of the customer.

13 ~~(7)~~(13) 'Public agency' means the state and any city, county, city and county, municipal
 14 corporation, chartered organization, public district, or public authority located in whole
 15 or in part within this state which provides or has authority to provide fire-fighting, law
 16 enforcement, ambulance, medical, or other emergency services.

17 ~~(8)~~(14) 'Public safety agency' means a functional division of a public agency which
 18 provides fire-fighting, law enforcement, emergency medical, suicide prevention, ~~civil~~
 19 ~~defense~~ emergency management dispatching, poison control, drug prevention, child
 20 abuse, spouse abuse, or other emergency services.

21 ~~(8.1)~~(15) 'Public safety answering point' means the public safety agency which receives
 22 incoming '911' 9-1-1 telephone calls and dispatches appropriate public safety agencies
 23 to respond to such calls.

24 ~~(9)~~(16) 'Service supplier' means a person or entity who provides local exchange
 25 telephone service or wireless service to a telephone subscriber.

26 ~~(10)~~(17) 'Telephone subscriber' means a person or entity to whom local exchange
 27 telephone service or wireless service, either residential or commercial, is provided and
 28 in return for which the person or entity is billed on a monthly basis. When the same
 29 person, business, or organization has several telephone access lines, each exchange access
 30 facility shall constitute a separate subscription. When the same person, business, or
 31 organization has several wireless telephones, each wireless telecommunications
 32 connection shall constitute a separate connection.

33 ~~(11)~~(18) 'Wireless enhanced "911" 9-1-1 charge' means a contribution to the local
 34 government for the following:

- 35 (A) The costs to the local government of implementing or upgrading, and maintaining,
 36 an emergency '911' 9-1-1 system which is capable of receiving and utilizing the
 37 following information, as it relates to '911' 9-1-1 calls made from a wireless

1 telecommunications connection: automatic number identification, the location of the
 2 base station or cell site which receives the '911' 9-1-1 call, and the location of the
 3 wireless telecommunications connection;

4 (B) Nonrecurring and recurring installation, maintenance, service, and network charges
 5 of a wireless service supplier to provide the information described in subparagraph (A)
 6 of this paragraph; and

7 (C) Other costs which may be paid with money from the Emergency Telephone
 8 System Fund, pursuant to subsection (e) of Code Section 46-5-134.

9 ~~(12)~~(19) 'Wireless service' means 'commercial mobile service' as defined under Section
 10 332(D) of the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 (47 U.S.C. Section 157, et seq.),
 11 regulations of the Federal Communications Commission, and the Omnibus Budget
 12 Reconciliation Act of 1993 (P.L. 103-66) and includes real-time, two-way interconnected
 13 voice service which is provided over networks which utilize intelligent switching
 14 capability and offer seamless handoff to customers. The term does not include one-way
 15 signaling service, data transmission service, nonlocal radio access line service, or a
 16 private telecommunications service.

17 ~~(13)~~(20) 'Wireless service supplier' means a provider of wireless service.

18 ~~(14)~~(21) 'Wireless telecommunications connection' means any mobile station for wireless
 19 service that connects a provider of wireless service to a provider of local exchange
 20 telephone service.

21 46-5-123.

22 (a) For the purposes of the development and implementation of a plan for the state-wide
 23 emergency telephone number '911' 9-1-1 system, there is created the '911' 9-1-1 Advisory
 24 Committee to be composed of the director of emergency management, who shall serve as
 25 chairperson; the ~~commissioner of administrative services~~ director of the Georgia
 26 Technology Authority or his or her designee; and ten other members appointed by the
 27 Governor, as follows:

28 (1) Three members appointed from nominees of the Georgia Municipal Association;

29 (2) Three members appointed from nominees of the Association County Commissioners
 30 of Georgia; and

31 (3) Four members who are experienced in and currently involved in the management of
 32 emergency telephone systems, at least one of whom shall be a representative of a wireless
 33 service supplier and one of whom shall be a representative of a land based service
 34 supplier.

1 (b) When appointments are made, the associations making nominations pursuant to this
 2 Code section shall submit at least three times as many nominees as positions to be filled
 3 at that time by nominees of the association.

4 (c) The appointed members of the committee shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.
 5 Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.

6 46-5-124.

7 (a) The agency shall develop guidelines for implementing a state-wide emergency
 8 telephone number '911' 9-1-1 system. The guidelines shall provide for:

9 (1) Steps of action necessary for public agencies to effect the necessary coordination,
 10 regulation, and development preliminary to a '911' 9-1-1 system that will incorporate the
 11 requirements of each public service agency in each local government of Georgia;

12 (2) Identification of mutual aid agreements necessary to effect the '911' 9-1-1 system,
 13 including coordination on behalf of the State of Georgia with any federal agency to
 14 secure financial assistance or other desirable activities in connection with the receipt of
 15 funding that may be provided to communities for the planning, development, or
 16 implementation of the '911' 9-1-1 system;

17 (3) The coordination necessary between local governments planning or developing a
 18 '911' 9-1-1 system and other state agencies, the Public Service Commission, all affected
 19 utility and telephone companies, wireless service suppliers, and other agencies;

20 (4) The actions to establish emergency telephone communications necessary to meet the
 21 requirements for each local government, including law enforcement, fire-fighting,
 22 medical, suicide prevention, rescue, or other emergency services; and

23 (5) The actions to be taken by a local government desiring to provide wireless enhanced
 24 '911' 9-1-1 service, including requirements contained in 47 Code of Federal Regulations
 25 Section 20.18.

26 (b) The agency shall be responsible for encouraging and promoting the planning,
 27 development, and implementation of local '911' 9-1-1 system plans. The agency shall
 28 develop any necessary procedures to be followed by public agencies for implementing and
 29 coordinating such plans and shall mediate whenever disputes arise or agreements cannot
 30 be reached between the local political jurisdiction and other ~~public agencies~~ entities
 31 involving the '911' 9-1-1 system.

32 (c) Subject to the approval of the Governor, the director shall be authorized to promulgate
 33 rules and regulations to establish minimum standards relating to training and equipment.
 34 Such training standards shall not be inconsistent with the training course or certification
 35 required for communications officers under Code Section 35-8-23. Notwithstanding any
 36 other law to the contrary, no communications officer hired to the staff of a '911' 9-1-1

1 communications center shall be required to complete his or her training pursuant to Code
2 Section 35-8-23 prior to being hired or employed for such position.

3 (d) The agency shall maintain the registry of wireless service suppliers provided for in
4 Code Section 46-5-124.1.

5 46-5-124.1.

6 (a) Any service provider doing business ~~Any wireless service supplier that provides~~
7 ~~wireless service or is authorized to provide wireless service~~ in Georgia shall register the
8 following information with the director:

9 (1) The name, address, and telephone number of the representative of the ~~wireless~~
10 service supplier to whom the resolution adopted pursuant to Code Section 46-5-133 or
11 other notification of intent to provide automatic number identification or automatic
12 location identification, or both, of a wireless telecommunications connection should be
13 submitted;

14 (2) The name, address, and telephone number of the representative of the ~~wireless~~
15 service supplier with whom a local government must coordinate to implement automatic
16 number identification or automatic location identification, or both, of a wireless
17 telecommunications connection;

18 (3) The counties in Georgia in which the ~~wireless~~ service supplier is authorized to
19 provide wireless service at the time the filing is made; and

20 (4) Every corporate name under which the ~~wireless~~ service supplier is authorized to
21 provide wireless service in Georgia.

22 (b) ~~A wireless service supplier shall notify the director of any change to the information~~
23 ~~described in subsection (a) of this Code section within 30 days of such change.~~ After the
24 initial submission by each service supplier doing business in this state, the information
25 required by subsection (a) of this Code section shall be updated and submitted to the
26 director by the tenth day of January and the tenth day of July of each year or such other
27 semiannual schedule as the director may establish.

28 (c) The director shall send a notice of delinquency to any service provider which fails to
29 comply with subsection (b) of this Code section. Such notice shall be sent by certified mail
30 or statutory overnight delivery. Any service provider which fails to register and provide the
31 information required by this Code section within 30 days after receipt of a notice of
32 delinquency shall not be eligible to receive cost recovery funds as provided in subsection
33 (e) of Code Section 46-5-134 until the service provider in compliance with subsection (b)
34 of this Code section.

1 46-5-125

2 Nothing in this part shall be construed to prohibit or discourage the formation of
3 multijurisdictional or regional ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 systems; and any system established pursuant to
4 this part may include the jurisdiction, or any portion thereof, of more than one public
5 agency.

6 46-5-126.

7 The agency shall coordinate its activities with those of the Public Service Commission,
8 which shall encourage the Georgia telephone industry to activate facility modification plans
9 for a timely ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 implementation.

10 46-5-127.

11 After January 1, 1978, no emergency telephone number ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 system shall be
12 established, and no existing system shall be expanded to provide wireless enhanced ~~'911'~~
13 9-1-1 service, without written confirmation by the agency that the local plan conforms to
14 the guidelines and procedures provided for in Code Section 46-5-124.

15 46-5-128.

16 All public agencies shall assist the agency in its efforts to carry out the intent of this part;
17 and such agencies shall comply with the guidelines developed pursuant to Code Section
18 46-5-124 by furnishing a resolution of intent regarding an emergency telephone number
19 ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 system.

20 46-5-129

21 The agency may develop a ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 emblem which may be utilized on marked vehicles
22 used by public safety agencies participating in a local ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 system.

23 46-5-130

24 The agency is authorized to apply for and accept federal funding assistance in the
25 development and implementation of a state-wide emergency telephone number ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1
26 system.

27 46-5-131

28 (a) Whether participating in a state-wide emergency ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 system or an emergency
29 ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 system serving one or more local governments, neither the state nor any local
30 government of the state nor any emergency ~~'911'~~ 9-1-1 system provider, its employees,
31 directors, officers, and agents, except in cases of wanton and willful misconduct or bad

1 faith, shall be liable for death or injury to the person or for damage to property as a result
 2 of either developing, adopting, establishing, participating in, implementing, maintaining,
 3 or carrying out duties involved in operating the '911' 9-1-1 emergency telephone system
 4 or in the identification of the telephone number, address, or name associated with any
 5 person accessing an emergency '911' 9-1-1 system.

20 Part 1 of Article 1 of Chapter 8 of Title 48 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
21 relating to general provisions relative to sales and use tax, is amended by striking in its

23 services, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

25 (a) For purposes of this Code section, the terms and corresponding definitions set forth in
26 4 U.S.C. Section 124 shall apply. In addition, as used in this Code section, the term:

27 (1) 'Enhanced ZIP code' means a United States postal ZIP code of 9 or more digits.

28 (2) 'Fee' shall include, without limitation, any emergency 9-1-1 charge imposed pursuant
29 to Part 4 of Article 2 of Chapter 5 of Title 46.

30 (3) 'FIPS' means the Federal Information Processing Standard (FIPS) 55-3 or any future
31 enhancement.

32 (4) 'Home service provider' means the facilities based carrier or reseller with which the
33 customer contracts for the provision of mobile telecommunications services.

1 (5) 'Mobile telecommunications service' means commercial mobile radio service, as such
2 term is defined in 47 C.F.R. Section 20.3 as in effect on June 1, 1999, or as subsequently
3 amended.

4 (6) 'Place of primary use' means the street address representative of where the customer's
5 use of the mobile telecommunications service primarily occurs, which must be the
6 residential street address or the primary business street address of the customer, identified
7 by an enhanced ZIP code and FIPS code.

8 (7) 'Taxing jurisdiction' means the state or any municipality or county.

9 (b) Subject to the provisions of 4 U.S.C. Section 116(c), the tax levied by this chapter shall
10 apply only to those charges for mobile telecommunications services subject to tax that are
11 deemed to be provided to a customer by a home service provider pursuant to 4 U.S.C.
12 Section 117(a) if the customer's place of primary use is located within this state, regardless
13 of where the mobile telecommunications services originate, terminate, or pass through.

14 (c) If a customer believes that an amount of tax, charge, or fee or an assignment of place
15 of primary use or taxing jurisdiction included on a bill under the provisions of this Code
16 section is erroneous, the customer shall notify the home service provider ~~in writing~~ as
17 provided in subsection (g) of this Code section. The customer shall include in this written
18 notification the street address for the customer's place of primary use, the account name
19 and number for which the customer seeks a correction, a description of the error asserted
20 by the customer, and any other information that the home service provider reasonably
21 requires to process the request. Within 60 days of receiving a notice under this subsection,
22 the home service provider shall review its records to determine the customer's taxing
23 jurisdiction. If this review shows that the amount of tax, charge, or fee or assignment of
24 place of primary use or taxing jurisdiction is in error, the home service provider shall
25 correct the error and refund or credit the amount of tax, charge, or fee erroneously collected
26 from the customer for a period of up to two years. If this review shows that the amount of
27 tax, charge, or fee or assignment of place of primary use or taxing jurisdiction is correct,
28 the home service provider shall provide a written explanation to the customer. The
29 procedures in this subsection shall be the first course of remedy available to customers

37 aggregated with and not separately stated from the amount paid or charged for any

2 shall be treated as being subject to such tax unless the home service provider can

14 (e)(1) A mobile telecommunications services provider who is obligated to remit or pay
15 the tax levied by this chapter shall be held harmless from any liability, including tax,
16 interest, and penalties, which would otherwise be due solely as a result of an assignment
17 of a place of primary use to an incorrect jurisdiction, if the mobile telecommunications
18 services provider satisfies the requirements of 4 U.S.C. Section 120(a).

19 (2)(A) The department may elect to provide an electronic data base that satisfies the
20 requirements of 4 U.S.C. Section 119. If the department provides such data base, a
21 home service provider using the data contained in such data base shall be held harmless
22 from any liability, including tax, interest, and penalties, which would otherwise be due
23 solely as a result of an assignment of a place of primary use to an incorrect local
24 jurisdiction.

25 (B) Paragraph (1) of this subsection shall apply to a home service provider who is in
26 compliance with the terms of such paragraph until the later of:

27 (i) Eighteen months after the approval described in 4 U.S.C. Section 119(a); or

28 (ii) Six months after the department provides an electronic data base that satisfies the
29 requirements of 4 U.S.C. Section 119.

30 (3) A home service provider shall be responsible for obtaining and maintaining the
31 customer's place of primary use. Subject to paragraph (5) of this subsection, if the home
32 service provider's reliance on information provided by its customer is in good faith:

33 (A) The home service provider shall be entitled to rely on the applicable residential or
34 business street address supplied by such customer; and

35 (B) The home service provider shall be held harmless from liability for any additional
36 tax, including any related interest or penalties, which is based on a different
37 determination of such customer's place of primary use.

1 (4) Except as provided in paragraph (5) of this subsection, a home service provider shall
 2 be allowed to treat the address used for purposes of the tax levied by this chapter for any
 3 customer under a service contract in effect on August 1, 2002, as that customer's place

 5 any extension or renewal of such service contract or agreement.

Code Section 50-18-72 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to when public disclosure not required and disclosure of exempting legal authority, is amended by striking in its entirety paragraph (16) of subsection (a) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"(16) Unless the request is made by the accused in a criminal case or by his or her attorney, public records of an emergency ~~911~~ 9-1-1 system, as defined in paragraph (3) of Code Section 46-5-122, containing information which would reveal the name, address, or telephone number of a person placing a call to a public safety answering point, which information may be redacted from such records if necessary to prevent the disclosure of the identity of a confidential source, to prevent disclosure of material which would endanger the life or physical safety of any person or persons, or to prevent the disclosure of the existence of a confidential surveillance or investigation; or"

SECTION 12.

All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
