A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT

1 To create and establish the "Georgia Right to Self-defense Act of 2006"; to amend Article
2 2 of Chapter 3 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to justification
3 and excuse in criminal prosecutions, so as to provide that under certain circumstances there
4 is no duty to retreat when using force in defense of self or others or in defense of habitation;
5 to create a legal presumption for the reasonable use of force in self-defense cases; to amend
6 Article 1 of Chapter 11 of Title 51 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
7 general provisions for defenses to tort actions, so as to provide immunity from civil action
8 for the use of force in defense of self or others; to provide for related matters; to repeal
9 conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

11 style="text-align:center">**SECTION 1.**

12 This Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Georgia Right to Self-defense Act of
13 2006."

14 style="text-align:center">**SECTION 2.**

15 Article 2 of Chapter 3 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
16 justification and excuse in criminal prosecutions, is amended by striking subsection (a) of
17 Code Section 16-3-21, relating to the use of force in defense of self or others and evidence
18 of belief that force was necessary in murder or manslaughter prosecutions, and inserting in
19 its place a new subsection (a) to read as follows:

20 "(a) A person is justified in threatening or using force against another and does not have
21 a duty to retreat when and to the extent that he or she reasonably believes that such threat
22 or force is necessary to defend himself or herself or a third person against such other's
23 imminent use of unlawful force; however, except as provided in Code Section 16-3-23, a
24 person is justified in using force which is intended or likely to cause death or great bodily
25 harm only if he or she reasonably believes that such force is necessary to prevent death or

1 great bodily injury to himself or herself or a third person or to prevent the commission of
2 a forcible felony."

3 **SECTION 3.**

4 Said article is amended further by striking Code Section 16-3-23, relating to the use of force
5 in defense of habitation, and inserting in its place a new Code Section 16-3-23 to read as
6 follows:

7 "16-3-23.

8 (a) A person is justified in threatening or using force against another and does not have a
9 duty to retreat when and to the extent that he or she reasonably believes that such threat or
10 force is necessary to prevent or terminate such other's unlawful entry into or attack upon
11 a habitation; however, such person is justified in the use of force which is intended or likely
12 to cause death or great bodily harm only if:

13 (1) The entry is made or attempted in a violent and tumultuous manner and he or she
14 reasonably believes that the entry is attempted or made for the purpose of assaulting or
15 offering personal violence to any person dwelling or being therein and that such force is
16 necessary to prevent the assault or offer of personal violence;

17 (2) That force is used against another person who is not a member of the family or
18 household and who unlawfully and forcibly enters or has unlawfully and forcibly entered
19 the residence and the person using such force knew or had reason to believe that an
20 unlawful and forcible entry occurred; or

21 (3) The person using such force reasonably believes that the entry is made or attempted
22 for the purpose of committing a felony therein and that such force is necessary to prevent
23 the commission of the felony.

24 (b) A person is presumed to have held a reasonable fear of imminent threat of death or
25 serious bodily injury to himself or herself or to another when using defensive force that is
26 intended or likely to cause death or great bodily harm to another if the person against
27 whom the defensive force was used was in the process of unlawfully and forcibly entering
28 or had unlawfully and forcibly entered upon an occupied habitation and the person who
29 uses defensive force knew or had reason to believe that an unlawful and forcible entry was
30 occurring or had occurred."

31 **SECTION 4.**

32 Said article is amended further by striking Code Section 16-3-24.1, relating to defining
33 habitation and personal property, and inserting in its place a new Code Section 16-3-24.1 to
34 read as follows:

1 "16-3-24.1.

2 As used in Code Sections 16-3-23 and 16-3-24, the term 'habitation' means any dwelling,
3 motor vehicle, camper or other similar shelter generally used for occupation overnight, or
4 place of business, and 'personal property' means personal property other than a motor
5 vehicle."

6 **SECTION 5.**

7 Article 1 of Chapter 11 of Title 51 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
8 general provisions for the defenses to tort actions, is amended by striking Code Section
9 51-11-9, relating to immunity from civil liability for threat or use of force in defense of
10 habitation, and inserting in its place a new Code Section 51-11-9 to read as follows:

11 "51-11-9.

12 A person who is justified in threatening or using force against another under the provisions
13 of Code Section 16-3-21 or 16-3-23, relating to the use of force in defense of self or others
14 or defense of a habitation, respectively, shall not be held liable in any civil action brought
15 as a result of the threat or use of such force."

16 **SECTION 6.**

17 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
