A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- To amend Article 1 of Chapter 6 of Title 3 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, 1
- 2 relating to general provisions relative to wine, so as to authorize restaurant patrons to remove
- 3 for off-premises consumption a resealed partially consumed bottle of wine that was
- 4 purchased with a full-course meal; to provide for a definition of the term full-course meal;
- 5 to amend Article 11 of Chapter 6 of Title 40 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
- relating to miscellaneous provisions of the uniform rules of the road, so as to provide that a 6
- 7 resealed partially consumed bottle of wine that was purchased with a full-course meal is not
- an open alcoholic beverage container for purposes of the prohibition against possessing an 8
- 9 open container of alcohol in the passenger area of a motor vehicle; to provide for related
- 10 matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

12 **SECTION 1.**

- Article 1 of Chapter 6 of Title 3 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to 13
- 14 general provisions relative to wine, is amended by inserting at the end thereof a new Code
- 15 Section 3-6-4 to read as follows:
- "3-6-4. 16

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- 17 (a) As used in this Code section, the term 'full-course meal' means a meal consisting of a
- salad or vegetable, an entree, a beverage, and bread. 18
- 19 (b) Notwithstanding any other contrary provision of law, any establishment which is
- licensed to sell alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises may permit a patron 20
- 21 to remove one unsealed bottle of wine per patron for consumption off premises, if the
- 22 patron has purchased a full-course meal and consumed a portion of the bottle of wine on
- 24 of wine that is to be removed from the premises must be securely resealed by the licensee

the premises with such meal on the establishment's premises. A partially consumed bottle

- or its employees before removal from the premises. The partially consumed bottle of wine
- 26 shall be placed in a bag or other container that is secured in such a manner that it is visibly

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1 apparent if the container has been subsequently opened or tampered with, and a dated

- 2 receipt for the bottle of wine and full-course meal shall be provided by the licensee and
- 3 attached to the container. If transported in a motor vehicle, the container with the resealed
- 4 bottle of wine shall be placed in a locked glove compartment, a locked trunk, or the area
- 5 behind the last upright seat of a motor vehicle that is not equipped with a trunk."

6 SECTION 2.

- 7 Article 11 of Chapter 6 of Title 40 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
- 8 miscellaneous provisions of the uniform rules of the road, is amended by striking paragraph
- 9 (2) of subsection (a) of Code Section 40-6-253, relating to consumption of alcoholic
- 10 beverages or possession of open container of alcoholic beverage in passenger area, and
- inserting in its place a new paragraph (2) to read as follows:
- 12 "(2) 'Open alcoholic beverage container' means any bottle, can, or other receptacle that:
- 13 (A) Contains any amount of alcoholic beverage; and
- 14 (B)(i) Is open or has a broken seal; or
- 15 (ii) The contents of which are partially removed.
- A bottle of wine that has been resealed and is transported pursuant to Code Section 3-6-4
- shall not constitute an open alcoholic beverage container for purposes of this Code
- 18 <u>section.</u>"

19 SECTION 3.

20 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
