

The Senate Transportation Committee offered the following substitute to SR 136:

A RESOLUTION

1 Dedicating the Emmett Henry Austin Memorial Bridge; and for other purposes.

2 WHEREAS, Emmett Henry Austin was born January 28, 1906, in Douglas County, Georgia;
3 and

4 WHEREAS, on October 14, 1923, he married Lena Mae Croker of Paulding County and they
5 then moved to Powder Springs, Georgia, where they resided until their deaths; and

6 WHEREAS, he sharecropped for a few years and in 1932 helped hang electrical wiring and
7 motors when Clark Thread Company built Clarkdale Mills; and

8 WHEREAS, in 1935 he helped build the bridge and Highway 278 into Powder Springs and
9 in 1938 the Highway 92 bridge in Hiram; and

10 WHEREAS, when the new REA was established in 1936, he worked with Glen Florence and
11 Roy Richards to string the first wire for the community; and

12 WHEREAS, over the next several years he wired farmhouses too numerous to mention with
13 the help of his 11 year-old son; and

14 WHEREAS, when 220 volt power became available, he rewired many of these same houses;
15 and

16 WHEREAS, over his career he was an experienced electrician, plumber, mechanic, and
17 highway and bridge builder; and

18 WHEREAS, he raised eight children, 16 grandchildren, and numerous great-grandchildren,
19 many of whom still live in the Powder Springs/Cobb County area.

1 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
2 GEORGIA that the Powder Creek Bridge on C. H. James Parkway (SR 6/U.S. 278) between
3 Powder Springs-Dallas Road and Hill Road, in Cobb County, be dedicated as the Emmett
4 Henry Austin Memorial Bridge, and that the Department of Transportation is authorized and
5 directed to place and maintain appropriate markers dedicating the Emmett Henry Austin
6 Memorial Bridge.

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate is authorized and directed
8 to transmit appropriate copies of this resolution to the family of Emmett Henry Austin and
9 to the Department of Transportation.
