

The Senate Public Safety and Homeland Security Committee offered the following substitute to HB 394:

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT

1 To amend Article 2 of Chapter 11 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
2 relating to offenses against public order, so as to provide for the crime of unlawful conduct
3 during 9-1-1 calls; to provide for criminal penalties; to amend Part 4 of Article 2 of Chapter
4 5 of Title 46 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the emergency telephone
5 number 9-1-1 system, so as to define certain terms; to provide for an accounting; to provide
6 for a 9-1-1 surcharge on prepaid wireless service subscriptions; to provide for the collection
7 of such surcharge and the deposit of the same into the state treasury; to provide for the
8 Emergency 9-1-1 Assistance Fund; to provide a statement of intent with respect to the
9 appropriation of funds; to provide for the lapse of unexpended amounts; to provide for
10 administration of the fund by the Department of Community Affairs; to provide for grants
11 from the Emergency 9-1-1 Assistance Fund; to provide certain uniform, state-wide training
12 for directors of public safety answering points; to amend Chapter 5 of Title 46 of the Official
13 Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to telephone and telegraph service, so as to revise
14 definitions for purposes of conformity; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting
15 laws; and for other purposes.

16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

SECTION 1.

17 Article 2 of Chapter 11 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
18 offenses against public order, is amended by inserting a new Code section to read as follows:

19 "16-11-39.2.

20 (a) As used in this Code section, the term:

21 (1) 'Call' shall have the same meaning as set forth in paragraph (2.1) of Code Section
22 46-5-122.

23 (2) 'False report' means the fabrication of an incident or crime or of material information
24 relating to an incident or crime which the person making the report knows to be false at
25 the time of making the report.
26

1 (3) 'Harass' means to knowingly and willingly engage in any conduct directed toward a
2 communications officer that is likely to impede or interfere with such communications
3 officer's duties, that threatens such communication officer or any member of his or her
4 family, or that places any member of the public served or to be served by 9-1-1 service
5 in danger of injury or delayed assistance.

6 (4) 'Harassing' means the willful use of opprobrious and abusive language which has no
7 legitimate purpose in relation to imparting information relevant to an emergency call.

8 (5) '9-1-1' means a public safety answering point as defined in paragraph (15) of Code
9 Section 46-5-122. The term '9-1-1' also means the digits, address, Internet Protocol
10 address, or other information used to access or initiate a call to a public safety answering
11 point.

12 (b) A person commits the offense of unlawful conduct during a 9-1-1 telephone call if he
13 or she:

14 (1) Without provocation, uses obscene, vulgar, or profane language with the intent to
15 intimidate or harass a 9-1-1 communications officer;

16 (2) Calls or otherwise contacts 9-1-1, whether or not conversation ensues, for the purpose
17 of annoying, harassing, or molesting a 9-1-1 communications officer or for the purpose
18 of interfering with or disrupting emergency telephone service;

19 (3) Calls or otherwise contacts 9-1-1 and fails to hang up or disengage the connection for
20 the intended purpose of interfering with or disrupting emergency service;

21 (4) Calls or otherwise contacts 9-1-1 with the intention to harass a communications
22 officer; or

23 (5) Calls or otherwise contacts 9-1-1 and makes a false report.

24 (c) Any person who violates subsection (b) of this Code section shall be guilty of a
25 misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not more than
26 \$500.00 or 12 months in jail, or both.

27 (d) Any violation of subsection (b) of this Code section shall be considered to have been
28 committed in any county where such call to or contact with 9-1-1 originated or in any
29 county where the call to or contact with 9-1-1 was received."

30 SECTION 2.

31 Part 4 of Article 2 of Chapter 5 of Title 46 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
32 relating to the emergency telephone number 9-1-1 system, is amended by revising Part 4 as
33 follows:

"Part 4

2 46-5-120.

3 This part shall be known and may be cited as the 'Georgia Emergency Telephone Number
4 9-1-1 Service Act of 1977.'

5 46-5-121.

6 (a) The General Assembly finds and declares that it is in the public interest to shorten the
7 time required for a citizen to request and receive emergency aid. There currently exist
8 numerous different emergency phone numbers throughout the state. Provision for a single,
9 primary three-digit emergency number through which emergency services can be quickly
10 and efficiently obtained would provide a significant contribution to law enforcement and
11 other public service efforts by making it easier to notify public safety personnel. Such a
12 simplified means of procuring emergency services will result in the saving of lives, a
13 reduction in the destruction of property, and quicker apprehension of criminals. It is the
14 intent of the General Assembly to establish and implement a cohesive state-wide
15 emergency telephone number 9-1-1 system which will provide citizens with rapid, direct
16 access to public safety agencies by dialing telephone number 9-1-1 with the objective of
17 reducing the response time to situations requiring law enforcement, fire, medical, rescue,
18 and other emergency services.

19 (b) The General Assembly further finds and declares that the benefits of 9-1-1 service
20 should be widely available, regardless of whether a 9-1-1 call is placed from a traditional
21 landline telephone or from a wireless telephone. It is also in the public interest that users
22 of wireless telephones should bear some of the cost of providing this life-saving service,
23 as users of landline telephones currently do. It is the intent of the General Assembly to
24 bring wireless telephone service within the scope of this part and to establish a means by
25 which local public safety agencies may provide enhanced 9-1-1 service to wireless
26 telephone users.

27 (c) The General Assembly further finds and declares that communication technology is
28 rapidly and constantly changing. It is in the public interest that as different means of
29 accessing 9-1-1 service emerge, that the users of such technology bear some of the cost of
30 providing this life-saving service, as users of landline and wireless telephones currently do.
31 It is the intent of the General Assembly to bring these new and emerging technologies
32 within the scope of this part and establish a means by which local public safety agencies
33 may provide 9-1-1 service to such users.

1 (d) The General Assembly further finds and declares that the safety and well-being of the
 2 citizens of Georgia is of the utmost importance, and it is in the public interest to provide
 3 the highest level of emergency response service on a local, regional, and state-wide basis.

4 46-5-122.

5 As used in this part, the term:

6 (1) 'Addressing' means the assigning of a numerical address and street name (the name
 7 may be numerical) to each location within a local government's geographical area
 8 necessary to provide public safety service as determined by the local government. This
 9 address replaces any route and box number currently in place in the 9-1-1 data base and
 10 facilitates quicker response by public safety agencies.

11 (2) 'Agency' means the Georgia Emergency Management Agency established pursuant
 12 to Code Section 38-3-20 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

13 (2.1) 'Call' means any communication, message, signal, or transmission.

14 (2.2) 'Center' means the Georgia Public Safety Training Center.

15 (2.3) 'Department' means the Department of Community Affairs established pursuant to
 16 Code Section 50-8-1.

17 (3) 'Director' means the director of emergency management appointed pursuant to Code
 18 Section 38-3-20.

19 (4) 'Cost recovery' means the mechanism by which service suppliers may recover the
 20 recurring and nonrecurring costs they expend on the implementation of wireless 9-1-1
 21 services.

22 (5) 'Emergency 9-1-1 system' or '9-1-1 system' means a ~~local exchange~~ telephone service,
 23 computer service, or wireless service, or other service which facilitates the placing of
 24 calls by persons in need of emergency services to a public safety answering point by
 25 dialing the telephone number 9-1-1 and under which calls to 9-1-1 are answered or
 26 otherwise responded to by public safety answering points established and operated by the
 27 local government subscribing to the 9-1-1 service. The term 'emergency 9-1-1 system'
 28 also includes 'enhanced 9-1-1 service,' which means an emergency ~~telephone~~ system that
 29 provides the ~~caller~~ user with emergency 9-1-1 system service and, in addition, directs
 30 9-1-1 calls to appropriate public safety answering points by selective routing based on the
 31 geographical location from which the call originated and provides the capability for
 32 automatic number identification and automatic location identification features.

33 (6) 'Enhanced ZIP Code' means a United States postal ZIP Code of 9 or more digits.

34 (7) 'Exchange access facility' means the access from a particular telephone subscriber's
 35 premises to the telephone system of a service supplier. Exchange access facilities include
 36 service supplier provided access lines, PBX trunks, and Centrex network access registers,

1 all as defined by tariffs of the telephone companies as approved by the Georgia Public
2 Service Commission. The term 'exchange access facility,' also includes Voice over
3 Internet Protocol service suppliers and any other communication, message, signal, or
4 information delivery system capable of initiating a 9-1-1 emergency call. Exchange
5 access facilities do not include service supplier owned and operated telephone pay station
6 lines, Wide Area Telecommunications Services (WATS), Foreign Exchange (FX), or
7 incoming only lines.

8 (8) 'FIPS' means the Federal Information Processing Standard (FIPS) 55-3 or any future
9 enhancement.

10 (9) 'Local government' means any city, county, military base, or political subdivision of
11 Georgia and its agencies.

12 (10) 'Mobile telecommunications service' means commercial mobile radio service, as
13 such term is defined in 47 C.F.R. Section 20.3.

14 (11) '9-1-1 charge' means a contribution to the local government for the 9-1-1 service
15 start-up equipment costs, subscriber notification costs, addressing costs, billing costs,
16 nonrecurring and recurring installation, maintenance, service, and network charges of a
17 service supplier providing 9-1-1 service pursuant to this part, and costs associated with
18 the hiring, training, and compensating of dispatchers employed by the local government
19 to operate said 9-1-1 system at the public safety answering points.

20 (11.1) '9-1-1 number' means the digits, address, Internet Protocol address, or other
21 information used to access or initiate a call to a public safety answering point.

22 (12) 'Place of primary use' means the street address representative of where the
23 customer's use of the mobile telecommunications service primarily occurs, which must
24 be the residential street address or the primary business street address of the customer.

25 (12.1) 'Prepaid wireless service' means any method pursuant to which a customer pays
26 a wireless service provider in advance for a wireless telecommunications connection.
27 Such term shall include, without limitation, calling or usage privileges included with the
28 purchase of a wireless telephone as well as additional calling or usage privileges
29 purchased by any means, including, without limitation, a calling card, a wireless
30 communication, or an Internet transaction.

31 (13) 'Public agency' means the state and any city, county, city and county, municipal
32 corporation, chartered organization, public district, or public authority located in whole
33 or in part within this state which provides or has authority to provide fire-fighting, law
34 enforcement, ambulance, medical, or other emergency services.

35 (14) 'Public safety agency' means a functional division of a public agency which
36 provides fire-fighting, law enforcement, emergency medical, suicide prevention,

1 emergency management dispatching, poison control, drug prevention, child abuse, spouse
2 abuse, or other emergency services.

3 (15) 'Public safety answering point' means the public safety agency which receives
4 incoming 9-1-1 telephone calls and dispatches appropriate public safety agencies to
5 respond to such calls.

6 (16) 'Service supplier' means a person or entity who provides ~~local exchange~~ telephone
7 service ~~or wireless service~~ to a telephone subscriber.

8 (16.1) 'Telephone service' means any method by which a 9-1-1 emergency call is
9 delivered to a public safety answering point. The term 'telephone service' shall include
10 local exchange telephone service or other telephone communication service, wireless
11 service, prepaid wireless service, mobile telecommunications service, computer service,
12 Voice over Internet Protocol service, or any technology that delivers or is required by law
13 to deliver a call to a public safety answering point.

14 (17) 'Telephone subscriber' means a person or entity to whom ~~local exchange~~ telephone
15 service ~~or wireless service~~, either residential or commercial, is provided ~~and in return for~~
16 ~~which the person or entity is billed on a monthly basis~~. When the same person, business,
17 or organization has several telephone access lines, each exchange access facility shall
18 constitute a separate subscription. When the same person, business, or organization has
19 several wireless telephones, each wireless telecommunications connection shall constitute
20 a separate connection.

21 (17.1) 'Voice over Internet Protocol service' means any technology that permits a voice
22 conversation using a voice connection to a computer, whether through a microphone, a
23 telephone, or other device, which sends a digital signal over the Internet through a
24 broadband connection to be converted back to the human voice at a distant terminal and
25 that delivers or is required by law to deliver a call to a public safety answering point.

26 (17.2) 'Voice over Internet Protocol service supplier' means a person or entity who
27 provides Voice over Internet Protocol service to subscribers for a fee.

28 (18) 'Wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge' means a contribution to the local government for
29 the following:

30 (A) The costs to the local government of implementing or upgrading, and maintaining,
31 an emergency 9-1-1 system which is capable of receiving and utilizing the following
32 information, as it relates to 9-1-1 calls made from a wireless telecommunications
33 connection: automatic number identification, the location of the base station or cell site
34 which receives the 9-1-1 call, and the location of the wireless telecommunications
35 connection;

1 (B) Nonrecurring and recurring installation, maintenance, service, and network charges
 2 of a wireless service supplier to provide the information described in subparagraph (A)
 3 of this paragraph; and

4 (C) Other costs which may be paid with money from the Emergency Telephone
 5 System Fund, pursuant to subsection (e) of Code Section 46-5-134.

6 (19) 'Wireless service' means 'commercial mobile service' as defined under Section
 7 332(D) of the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 (47 U.S.C. Section 157, et seq.),
 8 regulations of the Federal Communications Commission, and the Omnibus Budget
 9 Reconciliation Act of 1993 (P.L. 103-66) and includes real-time, two-way interconnected
 10 voice service which is provided over networks which utilize intelligent switching
 11 capability and offer seamless handoff to customers. The term does not include one-way
 12 signaling service, data transmission service, nonlocal radio access line service, or a
 13 private telecommunications service. The term does include prepaid wireless service.

14 (20) 'Wireless service supplier' means a provider of wireless service.

15 (21) 'Wireless telecommunications connection' means any mobile station for wireless
 16 service that connects a provider of wireless service to a provider of ~~local exchange~~
 17 telephone service.

18 46-5-123.

19 (a) For the purposes of the development and implementation of a plan for the state-wide
 20 emergency ~~telephone number~~ 9-1-1 system, there is created the 9-1-1 Advisory Committee
 21 to be composed of the director of ~~emergency management~~ the agency, who shall serve as
 22 chairperson; the ~~director of the Georgia Technology Authority~~ commissioner of the
 23 department or his or her designee; and 12 other members appointed by the Governor, as
 24 follows:

25 (1) Three members appointed from nominees of the Georgia Municipal Association;

26 (2) Three members appointed from nominees of the Association County Commissioners
 27 of Georgia;

28 (3) Four members who are experienced in and currently involved in the management of
 29 emergency telephone systems; and

30 (4) Two members who are representatives of the telecommunications industry, one of
 31 whom shall be a representative of a wireless service supplier and one of whom shall be
 32 a representative of a land based service supplier.

33 (b) When appointments are made, the associations making nominations pursuant to this
 34 Code section shall submit at least three times as many nominees as positions to be filled
 35 at that time by nominees of the association.

1 (c) The appointed members of the committee shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.
 2 Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.

3 (d) The committee shall organize itself as it deems appropriate and may elect other officers
 4 from among its members.

5 (e) The committee shall hold meetings at the call of the chairperson; provided, however,
 6 that it shall meet at least three times a year. A quorum for transacting business shall be a
 7 majority of the members of the committee.

8 (f) The committee shall be assigned to the agency for administrative purposes only, as
 9 prescribed in Code Section 50-4-3.

10 (g) The committee shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

11 (1) Determine recipients of assistance grants provided for under 46-5-134.2;

12 (2) To study and evaluate the state-wide provision of 9-1-1 service;

13 (3) To identify any changes necessary to accomplish more effective and efficient 9-1-1
 14 service across this state;

15 (4) To identify any changes necessary in the assessment and collection of 9-1-1 fees;

16 (5) To make recommendations to the agency as to training that should be provided to
 17 directors of public safety answering points; and

18 (6) To provide an annual report which shall include proposed legislation, if any, to the
 19 Governor and the General Assembly by December 1 of each year.

20 46-5-124.

21 (a) The agency shall develop guidelines for implementing a state-wide emergency
 22 ~~telephone number~~ 9-1-1 system. The guidelines shall provide for:

23 (1) Steps of action necessary for public agencies to effect the necessary coordination,
 24 regulation, and development preliminary to a 9-1-1 system that ~~will~~ shall incorporate the
 25 requirements of each public service agency in each local government of Georgia;

26 (2) Identification of mutual aid agreements necessary to effect the 9-1-1 system,
 27 including coordination on behalf of the State of Georgia with any federal agency to
 28 secure financial assistance or other desirable activities in connection with the receipt of
 29 funding that may be provided to communities for the planning, development, or
 30 implementation of the 9-1-1 system;

31 (3) The coordination necessary between local governments planning or developing a
 32 9-1-1 system and other state agencies, the Public Service Commission, all affected utility
 33 and telephone companies, wireless service suppliers, and other agencies;

34 (4) The actions to establish emergency telephone ~~communications~~ service necessary to
 35 meet the requirements for each local government, including law enforcement,
 36 fire-fighting, medical, suicide prevention, rescue, or other emergency services; and

1 (5) The actions to be taken by a local government desiring to provide wireless enhanced
 2 9-1-1 service, including requirements contained in 47 Code of Federal Regulations
 3 Section 20.18.

4 (b) The agency shall be responsible for encouraging and promoting the planning,
 5 development, and implementation of local 9-1-1 system plans. The agency shall develop
 6 any necessary procedures to be followed by public agencies for implementing and
 7 coordinating such plans and shall mediate whenever disputes arise or agreements cannot
 8 be reached between the local political jurisdiction and other entities involving the 9-1-1
 9 system.

10 (c) ~~Subject to the approval of the Governor, the director shall be authorized to promulgate~~
 11 ~~rules and regulations to establish minimum standards relating to training and equipment.~~
 12 ~~Such training standards shall not be inconsistent with the training course or certification~~
 13 ~~required for communications officers under Code Section 35-8-23.~~ Notwithstanding any
 14 other law to the contrary, no communications officer hired to the staff of a ~~9-1-1~~
 15 ~~communications center~~ public safety answering point shall be required to complete his or
 16 her training pursuant to Code Section 35-8-23 prior to being hired or employed for such
 17 position.

18 (d) The agency shall maintain the registry of wireless service suppliers provided for in
 19 Code Section 46-5-124.1.

20 46-5-124.1.

21 (a) Any service supplier doing business in Georgia shall register the following information
 22 with the director:

23 (1) The name, address, and telephone number of the representative of the service supplier
 24 to whom the resolution adopted pursuant to Code Section 46-5-133 or other notification
 25 of intent to provide automatic number identification or automatic location identification,
 26 or both, of a wireless telecommunications connection should be submitted;

27 (2) The name, address, and telephone number of the representative of the service supplier
 28 with whom a local government must coordinate to implement automatic number
 29 identification or automatic location identification, or both, of a wireless
 30 telecommunications connection;

31 (3) The counties in Georgia in which the service supplier is authorized to provide
 32 wireless service at the time the filing is made; and

33 (4) Every corporate name under which the service supplier is authorized to provide
 34 wireless service in Georgia.

35 (b) After the initial submission by each service supplier doing business in this state, the
 36 information required by subsection (a) of this Code section shall be updated and submitted

1 to the director by the tenth day of January and the tenth day of July of each year or such
2 other semiannual schedule as the director may establish.

3 (c) The director shall send a notice of delinquency to any service supplier which fails to
4 comply with subsection (b) of this Code section. Such notice shall be sent by certified mail
5 or statutory overnight delivery. Any service supplier which fails to register and provide
6 the information required by this Code section within 30 days after receipt of a notice of
7 delinquency shall not be eligible to receive cost recovery funds as provided in subsection
8 (e) of Code Section 46-5-134 until the service supplier is in compliance with subsection (b)
9 of this Code section.

10 46-5-125.

11 Nothing in this part shall be construed to prohibit or discourage the formation of
12 multijurisdictional or regional 9-1-1 systems; and any system established pursuant to this
13 part may include the jurisdiction, or any portion thereof, of more than one public agency.

14 46-5-126.

15 The agency shall coordinate its activities with those of the Public Service Commission,
16 which shall encourage the Georgia telephone industry to activate facility modification plans
17 for a timely 9-1-1 implementation.

18 46-5-127.

19 After January 1, 1978, no emergency ~~telephone number~~ 9-1-1 system shall be established,
20 and no existing system shall be expanded to provide wireless enhanced 9-1-1 service,
21 without written confirmation by the agency that the local plan conforms to the guidelines
22 and procedures provided for in Code Section 46-5-124.

23 46-5-128.

24 All public agencies shall assist the agency in its efforts to carry out the intent of this part;
25 and such agencies shall comply with the guidelines developed pursuant to Code Section
26 46-5-124 by furnishing a resolution of intent regarding an emergency ~~telephone number~~
27 9-1-1 system.

28 46-5-129.

29 The agency may develop a 9-1-1 emblem which may be utilized on marked vehicles used
30 by public safety agencies participating in a local 9-1-1 system.

1 46-5-130.

2 The agency is authorized to apply for and accept federal funding assistance in the
3 development and implementation of a state-wide emergency ~~telephone number~~ 9-1-1
4 system.

5 46-5-131.

6 (a) Whether participating in a state-wide emergency 9-1-1 system or an emergency 9-1-1
7 system serving one or more local governments, neither the state nor any local government
8 of the state nor any emergency 9-1-1 system provider, its employees, directors, officers,
9 and agents, except in cases of wanton and willful misconduct or bad faith, shall be liable
10 for death or injury to ~~the~~ any person or for damage to property as a result of either
11 developing, adopting, establishing, participating in, implementing, maintaining, or carrying
12 out duties involved in operating the ~~9-1-1 emergency telephone~~ emergency 9-1-1 system
13 or in the identification of the telephone number, address, or name associated with any
14 person accessing an emergency 9-1-1 system.

15 (b) No local government of the State of Georgia shall be required to release, indemnify,
16 defend, or hold harmless any emergency 9-1-1 system provider from any loss, claim,
17 demand, suit, or other action or any liability whatsoever which arises out of subsection (a)
18 of this Code section, unless the local government agrees or has agreed to assume such
19 obligations.

20 46-5-132

21 It shall be unlawful for any ~~wireless~~ service supplier to assess or charge any fee for an
22 emergency ~~telephone~~ call placed on a ~~9-1-1 emergency telephone~~ an emergency 9-1-1
23 system. The prohibition provided for in this Code section shall only apply to actual
24 emergency ~~telephone~~ calls made on such system and shall not apply to nor prohibit any fee
25 assessed or charged for the implementation or enhancement of such system.

26 46-5-133.

27 (a) Subject to the provisions of subsection (b) of this Code section, the governing authority
28 of any local government which operates or which contracts for the operation of an
29 emergency 9-1-1 system is authorized to adopt a resolution to impose a monthly 9-1-1
30 charge upon each ~~exchange access facility~~ telephone service subscribed to by telephone
31 subscribers whose exchange access lines are in the areas served or which would be served
32 by the 9-1-1 service. Subject to the provisions of subsection (b) of this Code section and
33 of subparagraphs (a)(2)(A) and (a)(2)(B) of Code Section 46-5-134, the governing
34 authority of any local government which operates or contracts for the operation of an

1 emergency 9-1-1 system which is capable of providing or provides enhanced 9-1-1 service
 2 to persons or entities with a wireless telecommunications connection, excluding a military
 3 base, is authorized to adopt a resolution to impose a monthly wireless enhanced 9-1-1
 4 charge upon each wireless telecommunications connection, other than a connection for
 5 prepaid wireless service, subscribed to by telephone subscribers whose place of primary
 6 use is within the geographic area that is served by the local government or that would be
 7 served by the local government for the purpose of such an emergency 9-1-1 system. Such
 8 resolution, or any amendment to such resolution, shall fix a date on which such resolution
 9 and the imposition and collection of the 9-1-1 charge or wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge,
 10 as provided in the resolution, shall become effective; provided, however, that such effective
 11 date shall be at least 120 days following the date of the adoption of such resolution or any
 12 amendment to such resolution by the local government. The 9-1-1 charge must be uniform,
 13 may not vary according to the type of ~~exchange access facility~~ telephone service used, and
 14 may be billed on a monthly or quarterly basis. The wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge must
 15 be uniform, not vary according to the type of wireless telecommunications connection
 16 used, and may be billed on a monthly or quarterly basis.

17 (b)(1) Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection, no local government shall
 18 be authorized to exercise the power conferred by this Code section unless either:

19 (A) A majority of the voters residing in that political subdivision who vote in an
 20 election called for such purpose shall vote to authorize the implementation of this Code
 21 section. Such election shall be called and conducted as other special elections are called
 22 and conducted in such local government when requested by such local government
 23 authority. The question or questions on the ballot shall be as prescribed by the election
 24 superintendent, provided that separate questions may be posed regarding
 25 implementation of a 9-1-1 charge and of a wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge; or

26 (B) After a public hearing held upon not less than ten days' public notice.

27 (2) The provisions of paragraph (1) of this subsection shall not apply with respect to a
 28 local government if the governing authority of such local government has on or before
 29 March 7, 1988, contracted with a ~~local exchange~~ telephone service supplier for the
 30 purchase or operation, or both, of a ~~local exchange~~ telephone 9-1-1 system.

31 (c) On and after January 1, 1999, no monthly 9-1-1 charge provided for in this Code
 32 section ~~may~~ shall be imposed or continue to be imposed unless each ~~dispatch center~~ public
 33 safety answering point funded in whole or in part from such charges is in compliance with
 34 Code Section 36-60-19, relating to required TDD training for communications officers.

1 46-5-134.

2 (a)(1)(A) The telephone subscriber of an ~~exchange access facility~~ any telephone
3 service may be billed for the monthly 9-1-1 charge, if any, imposed with respect to that
4 facility such telephone service by the service supplier. Such 9-1-1 charge may not
5 exceed \$1.50 per month per ~~exchange access facility~~ telephone service provided to the
6 telephone subscriber. In the event that any telephone service supplier, due to its normal
7 billing practices, is unable to charge differing amounts set by each local government as
8 the 9-1-1 charge, such telephone service supplier shall collect on behalf of local
9 governments that have authorized a 9-1-1 charge \$1.50 per month per telephone service
10 provided to the telephone subscribers to whom it provides telephone service in every
11 area served by the emergency 9-1-1 system.

12 (B) All ~~exchange access facilities~~ telephone services billed to federal, state, or local
13 governments shall be exempt from the 9-1-1 charge. Each service supplier shall, on
14 behalf of the local government, collect the 9-1-1 charge from those telephone
15 subscribers to whom it provides ~~exchange~~ telephone service in the area served by the
16 emergency 9-1-1 system. As part of its normal billing process, the service supplier
17 shall collect the 9-1-1 charge for each month an ~~exchange access facility~~ a telephone

19 If a service supplier receives a partial payment for a bill from a telephone subscriber,
20 the service supplier shall apply the payment against the amount the telephone
21 subscriber owes the service supplier first.

22 (C) This paragraph shall not apply to wireless service or prepaid wireless service or the
23 telephone subscribers or service suppliers of such services.

24 (2)(A) If the governing authority of a local government operates or contracts for the
25 operation of an emergency 9-1-1 system which is capable of providing or provides
26 automatic number identification of a wireless telecommunications connection and the
27 location of the base station or cell site which receives a 9-1-1 call from a wireless
28 telecommunications connection, the subscriber of a wireless telecommunications
29 connection whose billing address is within the geographic area that is served by the
30 local government or that would be served by the local government for the purpose of
31 such an emergency 9-1-1 system may be billed for the monthly wireless enhanced 9-1-1
32 charge, if any, imposed with respect to that connection by the wireless service supplier.
33 Such wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge may not exceed the amount of the monthly 9-1-1
34 charge imposed upon other telephone subscribers of ~~exchange access facilities~~ pursuant
35 to paragraph (1) of this subsection nor exceed \$1.00 per month per wireless
36 telecommunications connection provided to the telephone subscriber.

1 (B) If the governing authority of a local government operates or contracts for the
2 operation of an emergency 9-1-1 system which is capable of providing or provides
3 automatic number identification and automatic location identification of a wireless
4 telecommunications connection, the subscriber of a wireless telecommunications
5 connection whose place of primary use is within the geographic area that is served by
6 the local government or that would be served by the local government for the purpose
7 of such an emergency 9-1-1 system may be billed for the monthly wireless enhanced
8 9-1-1 charge, if any, imposed with respect to that connection by the wireless service
9 supplier. Such wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge may not exceed the amount of the
10 monthly 9-1-1 charge imposed upon other telephone subscribers ~~of exchange access~~
11 ~~facilities~~ pursuant to paragraph (1) of this subsection and shall be imposed on a monthly
12 basis for each wireless telecommunications connection provided to the telephone
13 subscriber.

14 (C) All wireless telecommunications connections billed to federal, state, or local
15 governments shall be exempt from the wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge. Each wireless
16 service supplier shall, on behalf of the local government, collect the wireless enhanced
17 9-1-1 charge from those telephone subscribers whose place of primary use is within the
18 geographic area that is served by the local government or that would be served by the
19 local government for the purpose of such an emergency 9-1-1 system. As part of its
20 normal billing process, the wireless service supplier shall collect the wireless enhanced
21 9-1-1 charge for each month a wireless telecommunications connection is in service,
22 and it shall list the wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge as a separate entry on each bill. If
23 a wireless service supplier receives partial payment for a bill from a telephone
24 subscriber, the wireless service supplier shall apply the payment against the amount the
25 telephone subscriber owes the wireless service supplier first.

26 (D) Notwithstanding the foregoing, the application of any 9-1-1 service charge with
27 respect to a mobile telecommunications service, as defined in 4 U.S.C. Section 124(7),
28 shall be governed by the provisions of Code Section 48-8-6.

29 (E) This paragraph shall not apply to prepaid wireless service or the telephone
30 subscribers or service suppliers of such service.

31 (b) Every telephone subscriber in the area served by the emergency 9-1-1 system shall be
32 liable for the 9-1-1 charges and the wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charges imposed under this
33 Code section until it has been paid to the service supplier. A service supplier shall have no
34 obligation to take any legal action to enforce the collection of the 9-1-1 charge or wireless
35 enhanced 9-1-1 charge. The service supplier shall provide the governing authority within
36 60 days with the name and address of each subscriber who has refused to pay the 9-1-1
37 charge or wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge after such 9-1-1 charge or wireless enhanced

1 9-1-1 charge has become due. A collection action may be initiated the local government
2 that imposed the charges, and reasonable costs and attorneys' fees associated with that
3 collection action may be awarded to the local government collecting the 9-1-1 charge or
4 wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge.

5 (c) The local government contracting for the operation of an emergency 9-1-1 system shall
6 remain ultimately responsible to the service supplier for all emergency 9-1-1 system
7 installation, service, equipment, operation, and maintenance charges owed to the service
8 supplier. Any taxes due on emergency 9-1-1 system service provided by the service
9 supplier will be billed to the local government subscribing to the service. State and local
10 taxes do not apply to the 9-1-1 charge or wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge billed to
11 telephone subscribers under this Code section.

12 (d)(1) Each service supplier that collects 9-1-1 charges or wireless enhanced 9-1-1
13 charges on behalf of the local government is entitled to retain as an administrative fee an
14 amount equal to 3 percent of the gross 9-1-1 or wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge receipts
15 to be remitted to the local government; provided, however, that such amount shall not
16 exceed 3¢ for every dollar so remitted. The remaining amount shall be due quarterly to
17 the local government and shall be remitted to it no later than 60 days after the close of a
18 calendar quarter.

19 (2) The 9-1-1 charges and the wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charges collected by the service
20 supplier shall be deposited and accounted for in a separate restricted revenue fund known
21 as the Emergency Telephone System Fund maintained by the local government. The
22 local government may invest the money in the fund in the same manner that other
23 moneys of the local government may be invested and any income earned from such
24 investment shall be deposited into the Emergency Telephone System Fund.

25 (3) On or before July 1, 2005, any funds that may have been deposited in a separate
26 restricted wireless reserve account required by this Code section prior to such date shall
27 be transferred to the Emergency Telephone System Fund required by paragraph (2) of
28 this subsection.

29 (4) The local government may on an annual basis, and at its expense, audit or cause to
30 be audited the books and records of service suppliers with respect to the collection and
31 remittance of 9-1-1 charges.

32 (5) Such monthly 9-1-1 charges and wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charges may be reduced
33 at any time by the governing authority by resolution; provided, however, that ~~the~~ said
34 governing authority shall be required to reduce such monthly 9-1-1 charge or wireless
35 enhanced 9-1-1 charge at any time the projected revenues from 9-1-1 charges or wireless
36 enhanced 9-1-1 charges will cause the unexpended revenues in the Emergency Telephone
37 System Fund at the end of the fiscal year to exceed by one and one-half times the

1 unexpended revenues in such fund at the end of the immediately preceding fiscal year or
 2 at any time the unexpended revenues in such fund at the end of the fiscal year exceed by
 3 one and one-half times the unexpended revenues in such fund at the end of the
 4 immediately preceding fiscal year. Such reduction in the 9-1-1 charge or wireless
 5 enhanced 9-1-1 charge shall be in an amount which will avert the accumulation of
 6 revenues in such fund at the end of the fiscal year which will exceed by one and one-half
 7 times the amount of revenues in the fund at the end of the immediately preceding fiscal

9 (e) A wireless service supplier may recover its costs expended on the implementation and
 10 provision of wireless enhanced 9-1-1 services to subscribers in an amount not to exceed
 11 30¢ of each 9-1-1 charge collected from a place of primary use that is within the
 12 geographic area that is served by the local government or would be served by the local
 13 government for the purpose of such emergency 9-1-1 system; provided, however, that such
 14 amount may be increased to 45¢ upon implementation of step two of the state plan
 15 governing 9-1-1 enhanced communications as provided in subsection (g) of this Code
 16 section. Such cost recovery amount shall be based on the actual cost incurred by the
 17 wireless service supplier in providing wireless enhanced 9-1-1 services.

18 (f) In addition to cost recovery as provided in subsection (e) of this Code section, money
 19 from the Emergency Telephone System Fund shall be used only to pay for:

20 (1) The lease, purchase, or maintenance of emergency telephone equipment, including
 21 necessary computer hardware, software, and data base provisioning; addressing; and
 22 nonrecurring costs of establishing a 9-1-1 system;

23 (2) The rates associated with the service supplier's 9-1-1 service and other service
 24 supplier's recurring charges;

25 (3) The actual cost of salaries, including benefits, of employees hired by the local
 26 government solely for the operation and maintenance of the emergency 9-1-1 system and
 27 the actual cost of training such of those employees who work as dispatchers or who work
 28 as directors as that term is defined in Code Section 46-5-138.2;

29 (4) Office supplies of the public safety answering points used directly in providing
 30 emergency 9-1-1 system services;

31 (5) The cost of leasing or purchasing a building used as a public safety answering point.
 32 Moneys from the fund cannot be used for the construction or lease of an emergency 9-1-1
 33 system building until the local government has completed its street addressing plan;

34 (6) The lease, purchase, or maintenance of computer hardware and software used at a
 35 public safety answering point, including computer-assisted dispatch systems;

36 (7) Supplies directly related to providing emergency 9-1-1 system services, including the
 37 cost of printing emergency 9-1-1 system public education materials; and

1 (8) The lease, purchase, or maintenance of logging recorders used at a public safety
2 answering point to record telephone and radio traffic.

3 (g) All 9-1-1 systems and communication systems provided pursuant to this part shall
4 conform to the two-step state plan governing ~~9-1-1 enhanced communications~~ enhanced
5 9-1-1 service as follows:

6 (1) In step one, the governing authority of a local government shall operate or contract
7 for the operation of an emergency 9-1-1 system that provides or is capable of providing
8 automatic number identification of a wireless telecommunications connection and the
9 location of the base station or cell site which received a 9-1-1 call from a wireless
10 telecommunications connection; and

11 (2) In step two, the governing authority of a local government shall operate or contract
12 for the operation of an emergency 9-1-1 system that provides or is capable of providing
13 automatic number identification and automatic location of a wireless telecommunications
14 connection.

15 (h) The local government may contract with a service supplier for any term negotiated by
16 the service supplier and the local government for an emergency 9-1-1 system and may
17 make payments from the Emergency Telephone System Fund to provide any payments
18 required by the contract, subject to the limitations provided by subsection (e) of this Code
19 section.

20 (i) The service supplier shall maintain records of the amount of the 9-1-1 charges and
21 wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charges collected for a period of at least three years from the date
22 of collection. The local government may, at its expense, require an annual audit of the
23 service supplier's books and records with respect to the collection and remittance of the
24 9-1-1 charges and wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charges.

25 (j) In order to provide additional funding for the local government for emergency 9-1-1
26 system purposes, the local government may receive federal, state, municipal, or private
27 funds which shall be expended for the purposes of this part.

28 (k) Subject to the provisions of Code Section 46-5-133, a telephone subscriber may be
29 billed for the monthly 9-1-1 charge or wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge for up to 18 months
30 in advance of the date on which the 9-1-1 service system becomes fully operational.

31 (l) In the event the local government is a federal military base providing emergency
32 services to ~~local-exchange~~ telephone subscribers residing on the base, a ~~local-exchange~~
33 telephone service supplier is authorized to apply the 9-1-1 charges collected to the bill for
34 9-1-1 service rather than remit the funds to an Emergency Telephone System Fund.

35 (m)(1) Any local government collecting or expending any 9-1-1 charges or wireless
36 enhanced 9-1-1 charges in any fiscal year beginning on or after July 1, 2005, shall file an
37 annual report of its collections and expenditures in conjunction with the annual audit

1 required under Code Section 36-81-7. The form shall be designed by the state auditor
2 and shall be distributed to local governments administering such funds. The annual
3 report shall require certification by the recipient local government and by the local
4 government auditor that funds were expended in compliance with the expenditure
5 requirements of this Code section.

6 (2) Any local government which makes expenditures not in compliance with this Code
7 section may be held liable for pro rata reimbursement to telephone and wireless
8 telecommunications subscribers of amounts improperly expended. Such liability may be
9 established in judicial proceedings by any aggrieved party. The noncompliant local
10 government shall be solely financially responsible for the reimbursement and for any
11 costs associated with the reimbursement. Such reimbursement shall be accomplished by
12 the service suppliers abating the imposition of the 9-1-1 charges and ~~9-1-1~~ wireless
13 enhanced 9-1-1 charges until such abatement equals the total amount of the rebate.

14 46-5-134.1.

15 (a) This Code section shall apply in counties where the governing authorities of more than
16 one local government have adopted a resolution to impose a ~~wireless-enhanced~~ 9-1-1
17 charge in accordance with the provisions of subsection (a) of Code Section 46-5-133 and
18 notwithstanding any contrary provision of Code Section 46-5-133 or 46-5-134.

19 (b) A wireless service supplier may certify to any of the governing authorities described
20 in subsection (a) of this Code section that the wireless service supplier is unable to
21 determine whether the billing addresses of its subscribers are within the geographic area
22 that is served by such local government. Upon such certification, the wireless service
23 supplier shall be authorized to collect the 9-1-1 charge for wireless enhanced 9-1-1 charge
24 services from any of its subscribers whose billing address is within the county and is within
25 an area that is as close as reasonably possible to the geographic area that is served by such
26 local government. The wireless service supplier shall notify such subscribers that if such
27 subscriber's billing address is not within the geographic area served by such local
28 government, such subscriber is not obligated to pay the 9-1-1 charge for wireless enhanced

30 (c) Unless otherwise provided in an agreement among the governing authorities described
31 in subsection (a) of this Code section, the charges collected by a wireless service supplier
32 pursuant to this Code section shall be remitted to such governing authorities based upon
33 the number of calls from wireless telecommunications connections that each such
34 individual local government receives and counts relative to the total number of calls from
35 wireless telecommunications connections that are received and counted by all of such local
36 governments.

1 (d) The authority granted to a wireless service supplier pursuant to this Code section shall
2 terminate;

3 (1) On ~~on~~ the date that the wireless service supplier certifies to a governing authority
4 described in subsection (a) of this Code section that the wireless service supplier is able

12 (a) A 9-1-1 charge shall be imposed on all prepaid wireless service subscribed to by
13 telephone subscribers as provided in this Code section.

14 (b) A prepaid wireless service supplier shall:

15 (1) Charge and collect a fee in the amount of 3 percent of the wholesale price divided by
16 .7 of each block of prepaid wireless service purchased by each telephone subscriber,
17 whether such service is included with the initial purchase of a wireless telephone or other
18 device or is recorded on a wireless telephone or other device by the purchase of a calling
19 card, through an Internet transaction, by means of a wireless communication directly to
20 the telephone subscriber's wireless telephone or other device, or by any other means;

21 (2) Charge and collect a fee in the amount of 3 percent of the suggested retail price of
22 each block of prepaid wireless service purchased by each telephone subscriber, whether
23 such service is included with the initial purchase of a wireless telephone or other device
24 or is recorded on a wireless telephone or other device by the purchase of a calling card,
25 through an Internet transaction, by means of a wireless communication directly to the
26 telephone subscriber's wireless telephone or other device, or by any other means;

27 (3) Divide the total prepaid wireless service revenue earned and received in this state by
28 such prepaid wireless service supplier in a calendar month by \$50.00 and multiply the
29 quotient by \$1.50 to determine the amount of the fee to be paid to the department;

30 (4) Charge and collect a fee in the amount of \$1.50 from the account of each prepaid
31 wireless service telephone subscriber who has a sufficient positive balance as of the last
32 day of the month; or

33 (5) Use any other method to charge and collect the fee; provided, however, that in no
34 event shall the prepaid wireless service supplier charge and collect less than \$1.50 per the
35 average monthly amount of prepaid wireless service actually provided to a telephone
36 subscriber.

1 (c) A prepaid wireless service supplier shall indicate the method it elects to use pursuant
2 to subsection (b) of this Code section on reports filed with the department and on receipts
3 issued to the wholesale purchaser.

4 (d) All fees provided for in this Code section shall be paid to the department. A prepaid
5 wireless service supplier may pay all such fees it collects throughout this state in a single
6 remittance. Such fees shall be remitted monthly to the department not later than the
7 twentieth day of the month following the month in which they are collected. Any fee not
8 paid in a timely manner shall accrue interest at the rate of 15 percent per annum,
9 compounded daily, until the date they are paid. The department shall deposit all funds
10 received into the general fund of the state treasury in compliance with Article 4 of Chapter
11 12 of Title 45, the 'Budget Act.'

12 (e) The 9-1-1 Advisory Committee may, upon a majority vote of its members, audit or

34 (C) The agency may apply to the department for and receive a grant from the
35 Emergency 9-1-1 Assistance Fund for the reasonable administrative costs of supporting
36 the 9-1-1 Advisory Council as provided for in Code Section 46-5-123.

1 (3) Decisions on the issuance of assistance grants shall be made by the 9-1-1 Advisory
 2 Committee established by Code Section 46-5-123.

3 (g) The department shall promulgate written rules and regulations to provide for the
 4 application process and for the administration of the Emergency 9-1-1 Assistance Fund,
 5 and to otherwise implement the provisions of this Code section.

7 A service supplier, including any ~~telephone~~ company providing telephone services and its
 8 employees, directors, officers, and agents, is not liable for any damages in a civil action for
 9 injuries, death, or loss to persons or property incurred by any person as a result of any act
 10 or omission of a service supplier or any of its employees, directors, officers, or agents,
 11 except for willful or wanton misconduct, either in connection with developing, adopting,
 12 implementing, maintaining, or operating any emergency 9-1-1 system or in the
 13 identification of the telephone number, address, or name associated with any person
 14 accessing an emergency 9-1-1 system.

16 (a) The governing authority of a local government by resolution shall create an advisory
 17 board consisting of the sheriff, representatives from other public safety agencies which
 18 respond to emergency calls under the 9-1-1 system, and other individuals knowledgeable
 19 of emergency 9-1-1 systems and the emergency needs of the citizens of the local
 20 government, provided that such advisory board shall not exceed 13 members.

21 (b) The advisory board shall assist the local government in:

5 (a)(1) By proper resolution of the local governing bodies, an authority may be created
6 and activated by:

7 (A) Any two or more municipal corporations;

8 (B) Any two or more counties; or

9 (C) One or more municipal corporations and one or more counties.

10 (2) The resolutions creating and activating a joint authority shall specify the number of
11 members of the authority, the number to be appointed by each participating county or

23 (c) Each authority shall have all of the powers necessary or convenient to carry out and
24 effectuate the purposes and provisions of this part, including, but without limiting the
25 generality of the foregoing, the power:

26 (1) To bring and defend actions;

27 (2) To adopt and amend a corporate seal;

28 (3) To make and execute contracts and other instruments necessary to exercise the
29 powers of the authority;

30 (4) To receive and administer gifts, grants, and devises of any property;

31 (5) To operate emergency call answering services for law enforcement, emergency
32 management, fire, and emergency medical service agencies 24 hours a day, seven days
33 a week, 365 days a year;

34 (6) To acquire, by purchase, gift, or construction, any real or personal property desired
35 to be acquired to operate the emergency 9-1-1 system;

1 (7) To sell, lease, exchange, transfer, assign, pledge, mortgage, dispose of, or grant
2 options for any real or personal property or interest therein for any such purposes; and

3 (8) To mortgage, convey, pledge, or assign any properties, revenues, income, tolls,
4 charges, or fees owned or received by the authority.

5 (d) The authority shall elect a chairperson and such other officers as deemed necessary by
6 the authority. The authority shall select a director who shall be responsible for establishing
7 operating standards and procedures and overseeing the operations of the emergency 9-1-1
8 system. The director may be an employee working in the operation of the emergency 9-1-1
9 system. The authority shall be responsible for hiring, training, supervising, and disciplining
