## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Chapter 4 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
- 2 criminal attempt, conspiracy, and solicitation, so as to increase the maximum punishment for
- 3 convictions for criminal attempt to commit felonies punishable by death or life
- 4 imprisonment; to provide for related matters; to provide for an effective date and
- 5 applicability; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

7 SECTION 1.

- 8 Chapter 4 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to criminal attempt,
- 9 conspiracy, and solicitation, is amended by revising Code Section 16-4-6, relating to
- 10 penalties for criminal attempt, as follows:

- 12 (a) A person convicted of the offense of criminal attempt to commit a crime punishable
- by death or by life imprisonment shall be punished by imprisonment for not less than one
- year nor more than ten <u>30</u> years.
- 15 (b) A person convicted of the offense of criminal attempt to commit a felony, other than
- a felony punishable by death or life imprisonment, shall be punished by imprisonment for
- 17 not less than one year nor more than one-half the maximum period of time for which he or
- 18 <u>she</u> could have been sentenced if he <u>or she</u> had been convicted of the crime attempted, by
- one-half the maximum fine to which he <u>or she</u> could have been subjected if he <u>or she</u> had
- been convicted of the crime attempted, or both.
- 21 (c) A person convicted of the offense of criminal attempt to commit a misdemeanor shall
- be punished as for a misdemeanor."
- 23 SECTION 2.
- 24 This Act shall become effective on July 1, 2007, and shall apply to all crimes committed on
- and after that date.
