## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1	To amend Title 36 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to local government,
2	and Title 12 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to conservation and natural
3	resources, so as to redesignate and extensively revise certain provisions relating to land
4	conservation projects; to amend Title 12 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating
5	to conservation and natural resources, so as to make a corresponding change in a
6	cross-reference in certain provisions relating to the purpose and nature of the Oconee River
7	Greenway Authority; to change certain provisions relating to powers and duties of the State
8	Forestry Commission; to amend Article 1 of Chapter 23 of Title 50 of the Official Code of
9	Georgia Annotated, relating to the Georgia Environmental Facilities Authority, so as to
10	change certain provisions relating to definitions; to change certain provisions relating to
11	purpose, powers, and duties of the authority; to change certain provisions relating to grants
12	and loans to local governments and repayment thereof; to provide certain penalties for failure

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

to remit funds due the authority; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

15 **PART I**16 **SECTION 1-1.** 

- 17 Title 36 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to local government, and Title
- 18 12 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to conservation and natural resources,
- 19 are amended by redesignating Chapter 22 of the former title, relating to land conservation,
- 20 as Chapter 6A of the latter title and by revising said chapter as follows:

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- The intent of this chapter is to provide a flexible framework within which cities and
- 24 counties in this state, the Department of Natural Resources, other state and federal

1 departments and agencies, state authorities, and private partners can protect the state's 2 valuable natural resources. The General Assembly recognizes that the state-wide network 3 of land and water resources, the state's prime agricultural and forestry lands, and its 4 natural, cultural, historic, and recreational areas are a priceless legacy that enhance the 5 health of ecosystems, encourage working landscapes, foster natural resource stewardship, 6 sustain a healthy economy, and promote a sustainable high quality of life for current and 7 future generations of Georgians. The process provided by this chapter is intended to promote partnerships for the conservation of land resources that are identified by cities or 8 9

- counties as locally valuable or identified by the Department of Natural Resources
- 10 department as having state-wide significance. This chapter will shall also provide land
- conservation funding options, which will to augment currently available local, state, and 11
- 12 federal funding.

- 15 (1) 'Authority' means the Georgia Environmental Facilities Authority established in Code

- 19 by cities and counties in this state to accomplish strategic investment in protection of
- 20 locally identified land resources with high environmental values or conservation benefits.
- 21 'Commission' means the State Forestry Commission established under Code Section
- 22 <u>12-6-2.</u>
- 23 (4) 'Conservation easement' means a conservation easement established in accordance
- 24 with Code Section 44-10-2.
- (5) 'Conservation land' means permanently protected land and water, or interests therein, 25
- that is in its undeveloped, natural state or that has been developed only to the extent 26
- 27 consistent with, or is restored to be consistent with, one or more of the following goals:
- (A) Water quality protection for rivers, streams, and lakes; 28
- 29 (B) Flood protection;
- 30 (C) Wetlands protection;
- 31 (D) Reduction of erosion through protection of steep slopes, areas with erodible soils,
- and stream banks; 32
- (E) Protection of riparian buffers and other areas that serve as natural habitat and 33
- 34 corridors for native plant and animal species;
- (F) Protection of prime agricultural and forestry lands; 35

1 (G) Protection of cultural sites, heritage corridors, and archeological and historic

- 2 resources;
- 3 (H) Scenic protection;
- 4 (I) Provision of recreation in the form of boating, hiking, camping, fishing, hunting,
- 5 running, jogging, biking, walking, or similar outdoor activities; and
- 6 (J) Connection of existing or planned areas contributing to the goals set out in this
- 7 paragraph.
- 8 (6) 'Costs of acquisition' means all direct costs of activities which are required by
- 9 applicable state laws and local ordinances or policies in order to obtain fee simple or
- lesser interests in real property or to convey a conservation easement to a holder who will
- ensure the permanent protection of the property as conservation land. Said costs shall
- include the purchase price, if any; the costs of due diligence investigation, such as
- appraisals, surveys, phase 1 environmental reports, and title searches; title insurance; fees
- for services related to the direct acquisition of the real property, such as holding costs,
- overhead costs, finder's fees, and real estate commissions; attorney fees; pro rata ad
- valorem taxes; resource stewardship; and other costs related to closing the transaction;
- provided, however, that said costs shall not include any costs for services provided in
- violation of Chapter 40 of Title 43.
- 19 (7) 'Council' means the Georgia Land Conservation Council established by this chapter.
- 20 (8) 'County' shall include consolidated county and municipal governments as well as a
- county.
- 22 (9) 'Department' means the Georgia Department of Natural Resources established in
- 23 Code Section 12-2-1. <u>'Land conservation project' means a conservation land project to</u>
- 24 <u>accomplish strategic investment in protection of identified land resources with high</u>
- 25 <u>environmental values or conservation benefits.</u>
- 26 (9.1) 'Nongovernmental entity' means a nonprofit organization the primary purposes of
- which are the permanent protection and conservation of land and natural resources.
- 28 (9.2) 'Other state authority' means a state authority that is otherwise created and
- 29 <u>authorized by law to engage in projects that would qualify as land conservation projects,</u>
- 30 to accept grants or loans, and to incur debt and is recommended by the department to
- 31 <u>receive either grants or loans for such a project; provided, however, that such term shall</u>
- 32 <u>not include the Georgia Building Authority.</u>
- 33 (9.3) 'Other state department or agency' means a state department or agency that is
- 34 <u>otherwise authorized by law to engage in projects that would qualify as land conservation</u>
- 35 projects.
- 36 (10) 'Permanently protected land and water' means those resources:

1 (A) Owned by the federal government and designated for recreation, conservation, or

- 2 natural resource;
- 3 (B) Owned by the State of Georgia and dedicated as a heritage preserve;
- 4 (C) Owned by a state or local unit of government or authority and subject to:
- 5 (i) A conservation easement that ensures that the land will be maintained as conservation land;
- 7 (ii) Contractual arrangements that ensure that, if the protected status is discontinued 8 on a parcel, such property will be replaced by other conservation land which at the 9 time of such replacement is of equal or greater monetary and resource protection 10 value;
- (iii) A restrictive covenant in favor of a federal governmental entity; or
- 12 (iv) A permanent restrictive covenant as provided in subsection (c) of Code Section 44-5-60;
- 14 (D) Owned by any person or not for profit or for profit entity, subject to a conservation 15 easement that ensures that the land will be maintained as conservation land; or
- 16 (E) Permanently legally protected by any other method that ensures the conservation 17 land will remain forever in uses which further the goals of this chapter.
- 18 (11) 'Revolving loan fund' means the Georgia Land Conservation Revolving Loan Fund 19 established by this chapter.
- 20 (12) 'State land conservation project' means conservation land projects sponsored by the
- 21 department to accomplish the strategic investment in protection of land resources
- 22 identified by the department as having high environmental values or conservation
- 23 benefits. Reserved.
- 24 (13) 'Trust fund' means the Georgia Land Conservation Trust Fund established by this
- chapter.
- 26 <del>36-22-3</del> <u>12-6A-3</u>.
- 27 (a) There is created the Georgia Land Conservation Council. The council shall be
- composed of the state property officer, who shall serve as chairperson, the commissioner
- of natural resources, the director of the State Forestry Commission, the executive director
- of the State Soil and Water Conservation Commission, the commissioner of community
- affairs, and four additional members to be appointed by and to serve at the pleasure of the
- 32 Governor.
- 33 (b) The members of the council shall receive no compensation for their services on the
- council but shall be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred while discharging the duties
- imposed upon them by this chapter.

1 (c) For administrative purposes, the council shall be attached to the authority. The

- 2 authority shall provide staff support to the council, utilizing personnel and funds available
- 3 to the authority.

- 5 (a) The Department of Natural Resources department may establish a land conservation
- 6 program consistent with the purposes of this chapter.
- 7 (a.1) There is established the Georgia Land Conservation Trust Fund and the Georgia Land
- 8 Conservation Revolving Loan Fund to consist of any moneys paid to the authority under
- 9 intergovernmental contract for purposes of this chapter, voluntary contributions to such
- funds, any federal moneys deposited in such funds, other moneys acquired for the use of
- such funds by any fund raising or other promotional techniques deemed appropriate by the
- 12 authority, and all interest thereon. Moneys which are restricted as to their usage, including,
- but not limited to, restrictions on the kinds of projects for which the moneys can be
- expended or loaned, on the entity that can receive grants or loans of such moneys, on the
- 15 manner in which such moneys can be expended or loaned, and any other condition,

- 26 cities and counties having an approved community land conservation project; having
- complied with state laws, regulations, contracts, and agreements; and having matching

- 30 <u>authority</u> having an approved state land conservation project.
- 31 (c) Within the revolving loan fund, moneys shall be made available in each fiscal year for
- loans to cities, and counties, and nongovernmental entities having approved community
- land conservation projects or for loans to state authorities specified by the department for
- purposes of approved state land conservation projects of the department. Any such loan
- shall bear interest at a rate established by the authority.

1 (d) Moneys granted from the trust fund or from the revolving loan fund shall be expended

- 2 solely to defray the costs of acquisition of conservation land as defined in this chapter or
- 3 of conservation easements which contribute to the goals set out for conservation land in
- 4 Code Section <del>36-22-2</del> <u>12-6A-2</u>.
- 5 (e) As a condition of project approval and release of funds, cities, counties, and the
- 6 department are the grant or loan recipient shall be required to record acquisitions of real
- 7 or partial interest in land purchased by <u>using</u> grants or loans established in this chapter with
- 8 the <del>Department of Natural Resources</del> <u>department</u>.
- 9 (f)(1) Each Georgia income tax return form for taxable years beginning on or after
- January 1, 2005, shall contain appropriate language, to be determined by the state revenue
- 11 commissioner, offering the taxpayer the opportunity to contribute to the Georgia Land
- 12 Conservation Trust Fund established in subsection (a) of this Code section by either
- donating all or any part of any tax refund due, by authorizing a reduction in the refund
- 14 check otherwise payable, or by contributing any amount over and above any amount of
- tax owed by adding that amount to the taxpayer's payment. The instructions
- accompanying the income tax return form shall contain a description of the purposes for
- which this fund was established and the intended use of moneys received from the
- 18 contributions. Each taxpayer required to file a state income tax return who desires to 19 contribute to the Georgia Land Conservation Trust Fund may designate such contribution
- as provided in this Code section on the appropriate income tax return form.
- 21 (2) The Department of Revenue shall determine annually the total amount so contributed,
- shall withhold therefrom a reasonable amount for administering this voluntary
- contribution program, and shall transmit the balance to the authority for deposit in the
- Georgia Land Conservation Trust Fund established in subsection (a.1) of this Code
- section; provided, however, that the amount retained for administrative costs shall not
- exceed \$50,000.00 per year. If, in any tax year, the administrative costs of the

- 34 the ownership and operation of the property as are outlined in Code Sections 12-3-32 and

- 36 (h) Cities, counties, and the department, the commission, other state departments or
- 37 <u>agencies, and other state authorities</u> may, by agreement with tax-exempt organizations

under Section 501(c)(3) of the federal Internal Revenue Code as established in a

- 2 memorandum of understanding adopted by the council, enter into partnerships to assist
- 3 with the development of land conservation project proposals, to assist with the
- 4 establishment of a local funding match, and to accept and administer property acquired by
- a city or county or the department, the commission, other state department or agency, or
- 6 <u>other state authority</u> pursuant to this chapter.

- 14 (a) Approval of a community land conservation project proposal for purposes of this
- chapter or a state land conservation project proposal for purposes of this chapter shall be
- accomplished as provided for in this Code section. Cities or counties and the department
- 17 shall Cities, counties, the department, the commission, other state departments or agencies,
- 18 <u>other state authorities, and nongovernmental entities may</u> develop and submit <del>community</del>
- 19 and state land conservation projects using rules and regulations established by the
- 20 authority. Cities, counties, and the department, the commission, other state departments
- 21 <u>or agencies, and other state authorities</u> may develop <del>community and state</del> land conservation
- 22 proposals in partnership with nonprofit environmental and conservation organizations and
- organizations that are tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the federal Internal Revenue
- 24 Code. The department shall make available its geographic information systems data as
- described in Code Section 36-22-13 12-6A-10 to cities, and counties, the commission,

- 32 capacity of the applicant to fulfill its matching fund or loan repayment commitments, for
- 33 the fiscal solvency of the entity identified as responsible for protecting and managing the

1 conservation land or conservation easement, and for compliance with all applicable terms

- 2 and conditions of this chapter.
- 3 (2) The authority shall make a recommendation based on its review of each land
- 4 conservation project to the council, including recommended funding sources, funding
- 5 levels, and the terms and conditions of those funds.
- 6 (c)(1) The department shall review each land conservation project proposal for its
- strategic investment in land resources with high environmental values or conservation
- 8 benefits; for consistency with the land conservation goals set forth in this chapter and the
- 9 land conservation priorities set forth by the Governor; for the merit of a plan for
- long-term management of the conservation land or conservation easement; and for
- 11 compliance with all applicable terms and conditions of this chapter.
- 12 (2) The department shall make a recommendation based on its review of each land
- 13 conservation project to the council, including any terms and conditions of those funds.
- 14 (d) The council shall review each land conservation project proposal and shall consider the
- recommendations of the authority and the department, as well as the procedures,
- 16 conditions, components, priorities, and criteria set forth in subsections (c) and (e) of this
- 17 Code section, and any rules and regulations promulgated by the authority. The decision
- of the council that a land conservation project complies with all of the required terms and
- conditions and is approved shall cause the city, county, or department, commission, other
- 20 <u>state department or agency, other state authority, or nongovernmental entity</u> to become

- 22 authority shall then be responsible for the execution of each such project approval decision

- proposals including, but not limited to, a schedule of meetings on an as needed basis, but
- 26 not less than quarterly, at which project proposals will be considered; the components
- 27 required to comprise a project proposal; the format in which project proposals will be
- presented for consideration by the council; the conditions which provide priority ranking
- 29 to be used in reviewing the merits of project proposals; and the means, such as a
- memorandum of understanding, by which organizations that are tax-exempt under
- 31 Section 501(c)(3) of the federal Internal Revenue Code may enter into partnerships with
- 32 cities, or counties, or the department, the commission, other state departments or agencies,
- 33 other state authorities, or nongovernmental entities to assist with the development and
- implementation of project proposals.
- 35 (f) The council shall use, at a minimum, the following criteria in granting project approval:
- 36 (1) The project shall promote the permanent protection of conservation land;

1 (2) The identification and commitment to the employment of local land use ordinances

- and local conservation and preservation ordinances, policies, and regulations which
- 3 further the achievement of the permanent protection of conservation land; and
- 4 (3) Project proposals which are multijurisdictional in scope or regional in impact will
- 5 receive additional ranking points.
- 6 (g) The council, the authority, <u>and</u> the department<del>, and the Georgia Building Authority</del>
- shall enter into contracts or memorandums of understanding, as appropriate and consistent
- 8 with the intent and provisions of this chapter, setting forth the details of how they will each

- organizations to provide program education to the public and private sector; to partner with

8 purpose, powers, and duties of the authority, by adding new paragraphs to read as follows:

"(23.1) To exercise such powers and perform such functions as provided for the authority

under Chapter 6A of Title 12, including but not limited to the making of grants and loans

as provided therein, for purposes of land conservation projects as defined in said chapter;

and to provide advisory, technical, consultative, training, educational, and assistance

services and enter into agreements for the same for purposes of such land conservation

14 projects;

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15 (23.2) To incorporate one or more nonprofit corporations as subsidiary corporations of

the authority for the purpose of carrying out any of the powers of the authority and to

accomplish any of the purposes of the authority including but not limited to accepting

donations to be used to advance state-wide energy education and energy efficiency and

conservation initiatives. Any subsidiary corporations created pursuant to this power shall

be created pursuant to Chapter 3 of Title 14, the 'Georgia Nonprofit Corporation Code,'

and the Secretary of State shall be authorized to accept such filings. Upon dissolution of

any subsidiary corporation of the authority, any assets shall revert to the authority or to

any successor to the authority or, failing such succession, to the State of Georgia. The

authority shall not be liable for the debts or obligations or bonds of any subsidiary

corporation or for the actions or omissions to act of any subsidiary corporation unless the

authority expressly so consents."

27 **SECTION 3-3.** 

28 Said article is further amended by revising subsection (a) of Code Section 50-23-6, relating

29 to grants and loans to local governments and repayment thereof, as follow:

30 "(a) The authority may make grants to governmental entities exercise such powers and

31 perform such functions as provided for in Chapter 22 of Title 36 and as otherwise provided

32 by law Reserved."

SECTION 3-4.

2 Said article is further amended by revising Code Section 50-23-20, relating to withholding

- 3 state funds from local governments failing to collect and remit amounts when due, as
- 4 follows:
- 5 "50-23-20.
- 6 (a) In the event of a failure of any local government or nongovernmental entity to collect
- and remit in full all amounts due to the authority and all amounts due to others, which
- 8 involve the credit or guarantee of the authority or of the state, on the date such amounts are
- 9 due under the terms of any bond, revenue bond, note, or other obligation of the local
- government or nongovernmental entity, it shall be the duty of the authority to notify the
- director of the Office of Treasury and Fiscal Services who shall withhold all funds of the
- state and all funds administered by the state, its agencies, boards, and instrumentalities
- allotted to such local government <u>or nongovernmental entity</u> until such local government
- or nongovernmental entity has collected and remitted in full all sums due and cured or
- remedied all defaults on any such bond, revenue bond, note, or other obligation.
- 16 (b) Nothing contained in this Code section shall mandate the withholding of funds
- allocated to a local government <u>or nongovernmental entity</u> which would violate contracts
- 18 to which the state is a party, the requirements of federal law imposed on the state, or
- 19 judgments of any court binding the state."
