A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1	To provide a new charter for the City of Allentown; to provide for incorporation, boundaries,
2	and powers of the city; to provide for government of the city by a city council composed of
3	a mayor and councilmembers; to provide for the election, service, compensation, powers, and
4	duties of the mayor and councilmembers; to provide for the powers and procedures of the
5	city council; to provide for city officers, employees, departments, and agencies; to provide
6	for a municipal court and its jurisdiction, powers, officers, and affairs; to provide for
7	municipal elections; to provide for the removal of officers; to provide for the imposition,
8	assessment, collection, and enforcement of various forms of municipal taxation; to provide
9	for municipal licenses, franchises, contracts, and conveyances; to provide for all other
10	matters necessary and proper for the city, its government, and the conduct of business as a
11	municipal corporation; to repeal a specific Act; to provide an effective date; to repeal
12	conflicting laws; and for other purposes.
13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:
14	ARTICLE I
15	INCORPORATION AND POWERS
16	SECTION 1.10.
17	Incorporation.
18	The City of Allentown in the Counties of Wilkinson and Twiggs and the inhabitants thereof
19	are hereby constituted and declared a body politic and corporate under the name and style

20 Allentown, Georgia, and by that name shall have perpetual succession.

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SECTION 1.11.

Boundaries.

3 (a) The corporate limits of this city shall be as follows: One mile in every direction from the center point between the rails of the Macon, Dublin, and Savannah Railroad at the public 4 5 highway crossing of the public road between the Four County Bank and the former H.C. Melton Store Lot in the Town of Allentown. The boundaries of this city at all times shall be 6 7 shown on a map, a written description, or any combination thereof, to be retained 8 permanently in the office of the city clerk and to be designated, as the case may be: "Official 9 Map (or description) of the corporate limits of the City of Allentown, Georgia." Photographic, typed, or other copies of such map or description certified by the town clerk 10 11 shall be admitted as evidence in all courts and shall have the same force and effect as with 12 the original map or description.

13 (b) The city council may provide for the redrawing of any such map by ordinance to reflect

14 lawful changes in the corporate boundaries. A redrawn map shall supersede for all purposes

15 the entire map or maps which it is designated to replace.

SECTION 1.12.

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Municipal powers.

(a) This city shall have all powers possible for a city to have under the present or future
Constitution and laws of this state as fully and completely as though they were specifically
enumerated in this charter. This city shall have all the powers of self-government not
otherwise prohibited by this charter or by general law.

(b) The powers of this city shall be construed liberally in favor of the city. The specific
mention or failure to mention particular powers shall not be construed as limiting in any way
the powers of this city. Said powers shall include, but are not limited to, the following:

(1) Air and water pollution. To regulate the emission of smoke or other exhaust which
pollutes the air and to prevent the pollution of natural streams which flow within the
corporate limits of the city;

(2) Animal regulations. To regulate and license or to prohibit the keeping or running
at large of animals and fowl and to provide for the impoundment of same if in violation
of any ordinance or lawful order; to provide for the disposition by sale, gift, or humane
destruction of animals and fowl when not redeemed as provided by ordinance; and to
provide punishment for violation of ordinances enacted under this paragraph;

(3) Appropriations and expenditures. To make appropriations for the support of the
 government of the city; to authorize the expenditure of money for any purposes

1 authorized by this charter and for any purpose for which a municipality is authorized by 2 the laws of the State of Georgia; and to provide for the payment of expenses of this city; 3 (4) Building regulations. To regulate and to license the erection and construction of 4 buildings and all other structures; to adopt building, housing, plumbing, electrical, gas, 5 and heating and air conditioning codes; and to regulate all housing and building trades; 6 (5) Business regulation and taxation. To levy and to provide for the collection of license 7 fees and taxes on privileges, occupations, trades, and professions as authorized by Title 8 48 of the O.C.G.A. or such other laws as are or may be hereafter enacted; to license and 9 regulate the same; to provide for the manner and method of payment of such licenses and 10 taxes; and to revoke such licenses after due process for the failure to pay any city taxes 11 or fees;

(6) Condemnation. To condemn property, inside or outside the corporate limits of the
city, for present or future use and for any corporate purpose deemed necessary by the
governing authority, utilizing procedures enumerated in Title 22 of the O.C.G.A. or such
other laws as are or may hereafter be enacted;

16 (7) Contracts. To enter into contracts and agreements with other governments and17 entities and with private persons, firms, and corporations;

- (8) Emergencies. To establish procedures for determining and proclaiming that an
 emergency situation exists inside or outside the city and to make and carry out all
 reasonable provisions deemed necessary to deal with or meet such an emergency for the
 protection, safety, health, or well-being of the citizens of the city;
- (9) Environmental protection. To protect and preserve the natural resources,
 environment, and vital areas of the state through the preservation and improvement of air
 quality, the restoration and maintenance of water resources, the control of erosion and
 sedimentation, the management of solid and hazardous waste, and other necessary actions
 for the protection of the environment;
- (10) Fire regulations. To fix and establish fire limits and from time to time extend,
 enlarge, or restrict the same; to prescribe fire safety regulations, not inconsistent with
 general law, relating to both fire prevention and detection and to fire fighting; and to
 prescribe penalties and punishment for violations thereof;
- (11) Garbage fees. To levy, fix, assess, and collect a garbage, refuse, and trash collection
 and disposal and other sanitary service charge, tax, or fee for such services as may be
 necessary in the operation of the city from all individuals, firms, and corporations
 residing in or doing business therein benefiting from such services; to enforce the
 payment of such charges, taxes, or fees; and to provide for the manner and method of
 collecting such service charges;

(12) General health, safety, and welfare. To define, regulate, and prohibit any act,
 practice, conduct, or use of property which is detrimental to the health, sanitation,
 cleanliness, welfare, and safety of the inhabitants of the city and to provide for the
 enforcement of such standards;

(13) Gifts. To accept or refuse gifts, donations, bequests, or grants from any source for
any purpose related to the powers and duties of the city and the general welfare of its
citizens on such terms and conditions as the donor or grantor may impose;

8 (14) Health and sanitation. To prescribe standards of health and sanitation within the city
9 and to provide for the enforcement of such standards;

(15) Jail sentences. To provide that persons given jail sentences in the city's court may
work out such sentences in any public works or on the streets, roads, drains, and squares
in the city; to provide for the commitment of such persons to any jail; or to provide for
the commitment of such persons to any county work camp or county jail by agreement
with the appropriate county officials;

- (16) Motor vehicles. To regulate the operation of motor vehicles and exercise control
 over all traffic, including parking, upon or across the streets, roads, alleys, and walkways
 of the city;
- (17) Municipal agencies and delegation of power. To create, alter, or abolish
 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies of the city and to confer upon
 such agencies the necessary and appropriate authority for carrying out all the powers
 conferred upon or delegated to the same;

(18) Municipal debts. To appropriate and borrow money for the payment of debts of the
city and to issue bonds for the purpose of raising revenue to carry out any project,
program, or venture authorized by this charter or the laws of the State of Georgia;

(19) Municipal property ownership. To acquire, dispose of, and hold in trust or otherwise
any real, personal, or mixed property, in fee simple or lesser interest, inside or outside the
property limits of the city;

(20) Municipal property protection. To provide for the preservation and protection of
property and equipment of the city and the administration and use of same by the public;
and to prescribe penalties and punishment for violations thereof;

31 (21) Municipal utilities. To acquire, lease, construct, operate, maintain, sell, and dispose
32 of public utilities, including, but not limited to, a system of waterworks, sewers, and
33 drains, sewage disposal, gas works, electric light plants, transportation facilities, public
34 airports, and any other public utility; and to fix the taxes, charges, rates, fares, fees,
35 assessments, regulations, and penalties therefor; and to provide for the withdrawal of
36 service for refusal or failure to pay the same;

- (22) Nuisances. To define a nuisance and provide for its abatement whether on public
 or private property;
- 3 (23) Penalties. To provide penalties for violation of any ordinances adopted pursuant to
 4 the authority of this charter and the laws of the State of Georgia;
- 5 (24) Planning and zoning. To provide comprehensive city planning for development by 6 zoning and to provide subdivision regulation and the like as the city council deems 7 necessary and reasonable to ensure a safe, healthy, and esthetically pleasing community; 8 (25) Police and fire protection. To exercise the power of arrest through duly appointed 9 police officers and to establish, operate, or contract for a police and a fire-fighting 10 agency;
- (26) Public hazards; removal. To provide for the destruction and removal of any building
 or other structure which is or may become dangerous or detrimental to the public;
- (27) Public improvements. To provide for the acquisition, construction, building, 13 operation, and maintenance of public ways, parks, playgrounds, recreational facilities, 14 15 cemeteries, markets and market houses, public buildings, libraries, public housing, airports, hospitals, terminals, docks, parking facilities, or charitable, cultural, educational, 16 17 recreational, conservation, sport, curative, corrective, detentional, penal, and medical 18 institutions, agencies, and facilities; to provide any other public improvements inside or 19 outside the corporate limits of the city; to regulate the use of public improvements; and, 20 for such purposes, property may be acquired by condemnation under Title 22 of the 21 O.C.G.A. or such other applicable laws as are or may hereafter be enacted;
- (28) Public peace. To provide for the prevention and punishment of drunkenness, riots,and public disturbances;
- (29) Public transportation. To organize and operate such public transportation systems
 as are deemed beneficial;
- (30) Public utilities and services. To grant franchises or make contracts for public
 utilities and public services and to prescribe the rates, fares, regulations, and standards
 and conditions of service applicable to the service to be provided by the franchise grantee
 or contractor, insofar as not in conflict with valid regulations of the Public Service
 Commission;
- 31 (31) Regulation of roadside areas. To prohibit or regulate and control the erection,
 32 removal, and maintenance of signs, billboards, trees, shrubs, fences, buildings, and any
 33 and all other structures or obstructions upon or adjacent to the rights of way of streets and
 34 roads or within view thereof, inside or abutting the corporate limits of the city and to
 35 prescribe penalties and punishment for violation of such ordinances;
- 36 (32) Retirement. To provide and maintain a retirement plan for officers and employees37 of the city;

(33) Roadways. To lay out, open, extend, widen, narrow, establish or change the grade
of, abandon or close, construct, pave, curb, gutter, adorn with shade trees, or otherwise
improve, maintain, repair, clean, prevent erosion of, and light the roads, alleys, and
walkways within the corporate limits of the city; to grant franchises and rights of way
throughout the streets and roads and over the bridges and viaducts for the use of public
utilities; and to require real estate owners to repair and maintain in a safe condition the
sidewalks adjoining their lots or lands and to impose penalties for failure to do so;

8 (34) Sewer fees. To levy a fee, charge, or sewer tax as necessary to assure the acquiring,
9 constructing, equipping, operating, maintaining, and extending of a sewage disposal plant
10 and sewerage system; to levy on those to whom sewers and sewerage systems are made
11 available a sewer service fee, charge, or tax for the availability or use of the sewers; to
12 provide for the manner and method of collecting such service charge; and to impose and
13 collect a sewer connection fee or fees to those connected with the system;

(35) Solid waste disposal. To provide for the collection and disposal of garbage, rubbish,
and refuse and to regulate the collection and disposal of garbage, rubbish, and refuse by
others; and to provide for the separate collection of glass, tin, aluminum, cardboard,
paper, and other recyclable materials and provide for the sale of such items;

18 (36) Special areas of public regulation. To regulate or prohibit junk dealers, pawn shops, 19 the manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors, and the use of firearms; 20 to regulate the transportation, storage, and use of combustible, explosive, and 21 inflammable materials, the use of lighting and heating equipment, and any other business 22 or situation which may be dangerous to persons or property; to regulate and control the 23 conduct of peddlers and itinerant traders, theatrical performances, exhibitions, and shows of any kind, by taxing or otherwise; and to license, tax, regulate, or prohibit professional 24 25 fortunetelling, palmistry, adult bookstores, and massage parlors;

26 (37) Special assessments. To levy and provide for the collection of special assessments
27 to cover the costs of any public improvement;

(38) Ad valorem taxes. To levy and provide for the assessment, valuation, revaluation,
and collection of taxes on all property subject to taxation;

30 (39) Other taxes. To levy and collect such other taxes as may be allowed now or in the31 future by law;

(40) Taxicabs. To regulate and license vehicles operated for hire in the city; to limit the
number of such vehicles; to require the operators thereof to be licensed; to require public
liability insurance on such vehicles in the amounts to be prescribed by ordinance; and to
regulate the parking of such vehicles;

36 (41) Urban redevelopment. To organize and operate an urban redevelopment program;37 and

1 (42) Other powers. To exercise and enjoy all other powers, functions, rights, privileges, 2 and immunities necessary or desirable to promote or protect the safety, health, peace, 3 security, good order, comfort, convenience, or general welfare of the city and its inhabitants; to exercise all implied powers necessary to carry into execution all powers 4 5 granted in this charter as fully and completely as if such powers were fully stated herein; 6 and to exercise all powers now or in the future authorized to be exercised by other 7 municipal governments under other laws of the State of Georgia; and no listing of particular powers in this charter shall be held to be exclusive of others, nor restrictive of 8 9 general words and phrases granting powers, but shall be held to be in addition to such powers unless expressly prohibited to municipalities under the Constitution or applicable 10 11 laws of the State of Georgia.

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SECTION 1.13.

13 Exercise of powers.

All powers, functions, rights, privileges, and immunities of the city, its officers, agencies, or employees shall be carried into execution as provided by this charter. If this charter makes no provision, such shall be carried into execution as provided by ordinance or as provided by pertinent laws of the State of Georgia.

18 ARTICLE II
19 LEGISLATIVE BRANCH
20 SECTION 2.10.

City council: creation, number, election.

22 The legislative authority of the government of this city, except as otherwise specifically provided in this charter, shall be vested in a city council to be composed of a mayor and five 23 24 councilmembers. The mayor and councilmembers shall be elected in the manner provided by this charter. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this charter or any previous charter, 25 the terms of the mayor and councilmembers serving on the effective date of this charter shall 26 continue until December 21, 2009, and until their successors are elected and qualified. On 27 28 the Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2009, and every four years thereafter, there shall be an election for a mayor and five councilmembers of the city, who 29 shall hold office for four years and until their successors are elected and qualified. At all 30 such elections all persons who are qualified under the Constitution and laws of Georgia to 31 vote for members of the General Assembly of Georgia and who have been bona fide 32

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1 residents of said city immediately preceding the date of such election shall be eligible to

2 qualify as voters in the election.

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SECTION 2.11.

City council: terms and qualifications for office.

5 The members of the city council shall serve for terms of four years and until their respective 6 successors are elected and qualified. No person shall be eligible to serve as mayor or 7 councilmember unless he or she has been a resident of the city for a period of 12 months 8 immediately prior to the date of the election of mayor or members of the city council; each 9 shall continue to reside therein during his or her period of service and to be registered and 10 qualified to vote in the municipal elections of this city.

- 11 SECTION 2.12.
- 12 Vacancies in office.

(a) Vacancies - The office of mayor or councilmember shall become vacant upon the
occurrence of any event specified by the Constitution, the incumbent's death, resignation,
forfeiture of office, or removal from office in any manner authorized by this charter or the
general laws of the State of Georgia, Title 45 of the O.C.G.A., or such other applicable laws
as are or may hereafter be enacted.
(b) Filling of vacancies - A vacancy in the office of mayor or councilmember shall be filled

19 as provided for in Section 5.14 of this charter.

21 Compensation and expenses.

The mayor and councilmembers shall receive compensation and expenses for their servicesas provided by ordinance.

SECTION 2.13.

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SECTION 2.14.

- 25 Conflicts of interest; holding other offices.
- (a) Conflict of interest No elected official, appointed officer, or employee of the city or any
 agency or political entity to which this charter applies shall knowingly:
- 28 (1) Engage in any business or transaction or have a financial or other personal interest,
- 29 direct or indirect, which is incompatible with the proper discharge of his or her official

duties or which would tend to impair the independence of his or her judgment or action
 in the performance of his or her official duties;
 (2) Engage in or accept private employment or render services for private interests when

such employment or service is incompatible with the proper discharge of his or her
official duties or would tend to impair the independence of his or her judgment or action
in the performance of his or her official duties;

7 (3) Disclose confidential information concerning the property, government, or affairs of
8 the governmental body by which he or she is engaged without proper legal authorization
9 or use such information to advance the financial or other private interest of himself or
10 herself or others;

(4) Accept any valuable gift, whether in the form of service, loan, object, or promise,
from any person, firm, or corporation which to his or her knowledge is interested, directly
or indirectly, in any manner whatsoever in business dealings with the governmental body
by which he or she is engaged; provided, however, that an elected official who is a
candidate for public office may accept campaign contributions and services in connection
with any such campaign;

- 17 (5) Represent other private interests in any action or proceeding against this city or any18 portion of its government; or
- (6) Vote or otherwise participate in the negotiation or in the making of any contract withany business or entity in which he or she has a financial interest.

21 (b) Disclosure - Any elected official, appointed officer, or employee who has any private 22 financial interest, directly or indirectly, in any contract or matter pending before or within 23 any department of the city shall disclose such private interest to the city council. The mayor or any councilmember who has a private interest in any matter pending before the city 24 25 council shall disclose such private interest and such disclosure shall be entered on the records 26 of the city council, and he or she shall disqualify himself or herself from participating in any 27 decision or vote relating thereto. Any elected official, appointed officer, or employee of any agency or political entity to which this charter applies who shall have any private financial 28 29 interest, directly or indirectly, in any contract or matter pending before or within such entity 30 shall disclose such private interest to the governing body of such agency or entity.

31 (c) Use of public property - No elected official, appointed officer, or employee of the city
32 or any agency or entity to which this charter applies shall use property owned by such
33 governmental entity for personal benefit, convenience, or profit, except in accordance with
34 policies promulgated by the city council or the governing body of such agency or entity.

35 (d) Contracts voidable and rescindable - Any violation of this section which occurs with the

36 knowledge, express or implied, of a party to a contract or sale shall render said contract or

37 sale voidable at the option of the city council.

(e) Ineligibility of elected official - Except where authorized by law, neither the mayor nor
any councilmember shall hold any other elective or compensated appointive office in the city
or otherwise be employed by said government or any agency thereof during the term for
which he or she was elected. No former mayor and no former councilmember shall hold any
compensated appointive office in the city until one year after the expiration of the term for
which he or she was elected.
(f) Political activities of certain officers and employees - No appointed officer and no

(i) Folitical activities of certain officers and employees - No appointed officer and no
employee of the city shall continue in such employment upon qualifying as a candidate for
nomination or election to any public office.

10 (g) Penalties for violation -

(1) Any city officer or employee who knowingly conceals such financial interest or
knowingly violates any of the requirements of this section shall be guilty of malfeasance
in office or position and shall be deemed to have forfeited such office or position.

(2) Any officer or employee of the city who forfeits his or her office or position as
described in paragraph (1) of this subsection shall be ineligible for appointment or
election to or employment in a position in the city government for a period of three years
thereafter.

SECTION 2.15.

The city council may make inquiries and investigations into the affairs of the city and the conduct of any department, officer, or agency thereof and for this purpose may subpoena witnesses, administer oaths, take testimony, and require the production of evidence. Any person who fails or refuses to obey a lawful order issued in the exercise of these powers by the city council shall be punished as provided by ordinance.

25SECTION 2.16.26General power and authority of the city council

Except as otherwise provided by this charter, the city council shall be vested with all thepowers of government of this city as provided by Article I of this charter.

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SECTION 2.17.

Eminent domain.

3 The city council is empowered to acquire, construct, operate, and maintain public ways, parks, public grounds, cemeteries, markets, market houses, public buildings, libraries, 4 5 sewers, drains, sewage treatment facilities, waterworks, electrical systems, cable television systems, gas systems, airports, hospitals, and charitable, educational, recreational, sport, 6 7 curative, corrective, detentional, penal, and medical institutions, agencies, and facilities and 8 any other public improvements inside or outside the city, and to regulate the use thereof; and, 9 for such purposes, property may be condemned under procedures established under general 10 law applicable now or as provided in the future.

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SECTION 2.18.

Organization and oath of office.

The city council shall hold an organizational meeting at the first regular meeting in January following an election. The meeting shall be called to order by the city clerk and the oath of the office shall be administered by a person duly authorized by law to administer oaths to the newly elected members as follows:

"I do solemnly (swear)(affirm) that I will faithfully perform the duties of 17 18 (mayor)(councilmember) of this city and that I will support and defend the charter thereof 19 as well as the Constitution and laws of the State of Georgia and of the United States of 20 America. I am not the holder of any unaccounted for public money due this state or any political subdivision or authority thereof. I am not the holder of any office of trust under 21 22 the government of the United States, any other state, or any foreign state which I by the 23 laws of the State of Georgia am prohibited from holding. I am otherwise qualified to hold 24 said office according to the Constitution and laws of Georgia. I have been a resident of the City of Allentown for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this state and by 25 26 the municipal charter. I will perform the duties of my office in the best interest of the City of Allentown to the best of my ability without fear, favor, affection, reward, or expectation 27 thereof." 28

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SECTION 2.19.

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Regular and special meetings.

31 (a) The city council shall hold regular meetings at such times and places as prescribed by32 ordinance.

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1 (b) Special meetings of the city council may be held on call of the mayor or three members 2 of the city council. Notice of such special meeting shall be served on all other members 3 personally, or by telephone personally, at least 48 hours in advance of the meeting. Such notice to councilmembers shall not be required if the mayor and all councilmembers are 4 present when the special meeting is called. Such notice of any special meeting may be 5 waived by a councilmember in writing before or after such a meeting and attendance at the 6 7 meeting shall also constitute a waiver of notice on any business transacted in such 8 councilmember's presence. Only the business stated in the call may be transacted at the 9 special meeting without unanimous consent of such councilmembers present.

10 (c) All meetings of the city council shall be public to the extent required by law and notice11 to the public of special meetings shall be given as required by law.

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SECTION 2.20.

13 Rules of procedure.

14 (a) The city council shall adopt its rules of procedure and order of business consistent with

the provisions of this charter and shall provide for keeping a journal of its proceedings whichshall be a public record.

(b) All committees and committee chairpersons and officers of the city council shall beappointed by the mayor and shall serve at the pleasure of the mayor. The mayor shall havethe power to appoint new members to any committee at any time.

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SECTION 2.21.

Quorum.

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Three councilmembers shall constitute a quorum and shall be authorized to transact the business of the city council. Voting on the adoption of ordinances shall be by voice vote and the vote shall be recorded in the journal, but any member of the city council shall have the right to request a roll-call vote and such vote shall be recorded in the journal. Except as otherwise provided in this charter, the affirmative vote of three councilmembers shall be required for the adoption of any ordinance, resolution, or motion.

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SECTION 2.22.

Ordinances.

30 (a) Every proposed ordinance should be introduced in writing and in the form required for31 final adoption. No ordinance shall contain a subject which is not expressed in its title. The

S. B. 557 - 12 - enacting clause shall be "The Council of the City of Allentown hereby ordains..." and every
ordinance shall so begin.
(b) An ordinance may be introduced by any councilmember and be read at a regular or
special meeting of the city council. Ordinances shall be considered and adopted or rejected
by the city council in accordance with the rules which it shall establish; provided, however,
an ordinance shall not be adopted the same day it is introduced, except for emergency
ordinances provided for in Section 2.24. Upon introduction of any ordinance, the city clerk

8 shall, as soon as possible, distribute a copy to the mayor and to each councilmember and

9 shall file a reasonable number of copies in the office of the city clerk and at such other public

10 places as the city council may designate.

- 11 SECTION 2.23.
- 12 Effect of ordinances.

13 Acts of the city council which have the force and effect of law shall be enacted by ordinance.

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SECTION 2.24.

Emergencies.

To meet a public emergency affecting life, health, property, or public peace, the city council 16 17 may convene on call of the mayor or three councilmembers and may promptly adopt an 18 emergency ordinance, but such ordinance shall not levy taxes; grant, renew, or extend a 19 franchise; regulate the rate charged by any public utility for its services; or authorize the 20 borrowing of money except for loans to be repaid within 30 days. An emergency ordinance 21 shall be introduced in the form prescribed for ordinances generally, except that it shall be 22 plainly designated as an emergency ordinance and shall contain, after the enacting clause, 23 a declaration stating that an emergency exists and describing the emergency in clear and specific terms. An emergency ordinance may be adopted, with or without amendment, or 24 25 rejected at the meeting at which it is introduced, but the affirmative vote of at least three 26 councilmembers shall be required for adoption. It shall become effective upon adoption or at such later time as it may specify. Every emergency ordinance shall automatically stand 27 28 repealed 30 days following the date upon which it was adopted, but this shall not prevent 29 reenactment of the ordinance in the manner specified in this section if the emergency continues to exist. An emergency ordinance shall also be repealed by adoption of a repealing 30 31 ordinance in the same manner specified in this section for adoption of emergency ordinances.

Codes of technical regulations.

3 (a) The city council may adopt any standard code of technical regulations by reference thereto in an adopting ordinance. The procedure and requirements governing such adopting 4 5 ordinance shall be as prescribed for ordinances generally except that: (1) the requirements of subsection (b) of Section 2.22 of this charter for distribution and filing of copies of the 6 7 ordinance shall be construed to include copies of any code of technical regulations, as well 8 as the adopting ordinance; and (2) a copy of each adopted code of technical regulations, as 9 well as the adopting ordinance, shall be authenticated and recorded by the city clerk pursuant 10 to Section 2.26 of this charter.

(a) The city clerk shall authenticate by his or her signature and record in full in a properlyindexed book kept for that purpose all ordinances adopted by the council.

(b) The city council shall provide for the preparation of a general codification of all the 17 18 ordinances of the city having the force and effect of law. The general codification shall be 19 adopted by the city council by ordinance and shall be published promptly together with all 20 amendments thereto and shall contain such codes of technical regulations and other rules and regulations as the city council may specify. This compilation shall be known and cited 21 22 officially as "The Code of the City of Allentown, Georgia." Copies of the code shall be 23 furnished to all officers, departments, and agencies of the city and shall be made available 24 for purchase by the public at a reasonable price as fixed by the city council.

(c) The city council shall cause each ordinance and each amendment to this charter to be 25 26 printed promptly following its adoption, and the printed ordinances and charter amendments 27 shall be made available for purchase by the public at reasonable prices to be fixed by the city council. Following publication of the first code under this charter and at all times thereafter, 28 29 the ordinances and charter amendments shall be printed in substantially the same style as the 30 code then in effect and shall be suitable in form for incorporation therein. The city council shall make such further arrangements as deemed desirable with reproduction and distribution 31 32 of any changes in or additions to codes of technical regulations and other rules and

33 regulations included in the code.

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SECTION 2.27.

Election of mayor; forfeiture; compensation.

The mayor shall be elected and serve for a term of four years and until a successor is elected and qualified. The mayor shall be a registered voter and qualified elector of this city and shall have been a resident of the city for 12 months immediately preceding his or her election. The mayor shall continue to reside in this city during the period of his or her service. The mayor shall forfeit his or her office on the same grounds and under the same procedure as for councilmembers. The compensation of the mayor shall be established in the same manner as for councilmembers.

By a majority vote, the city council shall elect a councilmember to serve as mayor pro tempore. Adoption.

9 (a) The city council may amend the operating budget proposed by the mayor, except that the
10 budget as finally amended and adopted must provide for all expenditures required by state
11 law or by other provisions of this charter and for all debt service requirements for the ensuing
12 fiscal year. The total appropriations from any fund shall not exceed the estimated fund
13 balance, reserves, and revenues.
14 (b) The city council by ordinance shall adopt the final operating budget for the ensuing fiscal
15 year not later than 60 days before the end of the previous fiscal year. If the city council fails

16 to adopt the budget by said date, the amounts appropriated for operation for the then current 17 fiscal year shall be deemed adopted for the ensuing fiscal year on a month-to-month basis, with all items prorated accordingly, until such time as the city council adopts a budget for 18 19 the ensuing fiscal year. Adoption of the budget shall take the form of an appropriations 20 ordinance setting out the estimated revenues in detail by sources and making appropriations 21 according to fund and by organizational unit, purpose, or activity as set out in the budget 22 preparation ordinance adopted pursuant to Section 6.23 of this charter. 23 (c) The amount set out in the adopted operating budget for each organizational unit shall

constitute the annual appropriation for such, and no expenditure shall be made or
encumbrance created in excess of the otherwise unencumbered balance of the appropriations
or allotments thereof to which it is chargeable.

Levy of taxes.

Following adoption of the operating budget, the city council shall levy by ordinance such taxes as are necessary. The taxes and tax rates set by such ordinance shall be such that reasonable estimates of revenues from such levy shall at least be sufficient, together with other anticipated revenues, fund balances, and applicable reserves, to equal the total amount appropriated for each of the several funds set forth in the annual operating budget for
 defraying the expense of the general government of this city.

Changes in budget.

5 The city council by ordinance may make changes in the appropriations contained in the 6 current operating budget at any regular meeting or special or emergency meeting called for 7 such purposes, but any additional appropriations may be made only from an existing 8 unexpended surplus.

10 Capital improvements.

11 (a) On or before the date fixed by the city council, but not later than 60 days prior to the beginning of each fiscal year, the mayor shall submit to the city council a proposed capital 12 improvements budget with his or her recommendations as to the means of financing the 13 14 improvements proposed for the ensuing year. The city council shall have the power to 15 accept, with or without amendments, or reject the proposed program and proposed means of financing. The city council shall not authorize an expenditure for the construction of any 16 17 building, structure, work, or improvement, unless the appropriations for such project are 18 included in the capital improvements budget, except to meet a public emergency as provided 19 in Section 2.24 of this charter. (b) The city council shall adopt by ordinance the final capital improvements budget for the 20 21 ensuing fiscal year not later than 60 days before the end of the previous fiscal year. No 22 appropriations provided for in a prior capital improvements budget shall lapse until the 23 purpose for which the appropriations were made shall have been accomplished or abandoned; 24 provided, however, the mayor may submit amendments to the capital improvements budget 25 at any time during the fiscal year, accompanied by his or her recommendations. Any such amendments to the capital improvements budget shall become effective only upon adoption 26

There shall be an annual independent audit of all city accounts, funds, and financialtransactions by a certified public accountant selected by the city council. The audit shall be

2 the state or federal government may be accepted as satisfying the requirements of this

3 charter. Copies of all audit reports shall be available at printing costs to the public.

6	No contract with the city shall be binding on the city unless:
7	(1) It is in writing;
8	(2) It is drawn by or submitted to and reviewed by the city attorney and, as a matter of

18	(a) The city council may sell and convey any real or personal property owned or held by the
19	city for governmental or other purposes as now or hereafter provided by law.
20	(b) The city council may quitclaim any rights it may have in property not needed for public
21	purposes upon request by the mayor and adoption of a resolution, both finding that the
22	property is not needed for public or other purposes and that the interest of the city has no
23	readily ascertainable monetary value.
24	(c) Whenever in opening, extending, or widening any street, avenue, alley, or public place
25	of the city a small parcel or tract of land is cut off or separated by such work from a larger
26	tract or boundary of land owned by the city, the city council may authorize the mayor to
27	execute and deliver in the name of the city a deed conveying said cut-off or separated parcel
28	or tract of land to an abutting or adjoining property owner or owners in exchange for rights
29	of way of said street, avenue, alley, or public place when such swap is deemed to be in the
30	best interest of the city. All deeds and conveyances heretofore and hereafter so executed and

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- 1 delivered shall convey all title and interest the city has in such property, notwithstanding the
- 2 fact that no public sale after advertisement was or is hereafter made.

7	The officers and employees of this city, both elected and appointed, shall execute such surety

12	All ordinances, resolutions, rules, and regulations now in force in the city not inconsistent

23	(a) Section captions in this charter are informative only and shall not be considered as a part
