

House Bill 566

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT

1 To amend Part 3 of Article 6 of Chapter 2 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia
2 Annotated, relating to educational programs, so as to enact the "Blind Persons' Braille
3 Literacy Rights and Education Act"; to provide definitions; to require an evaluation of a blind
4 or visually impaired child to determine such child's need for Braille instruction; to require
5 Braille instruction in the individualized education program of a blind or visually impaired
6 student; to provide requirements for textbook publishers relating to Braille instructional
7 materials; to provide license requirements relating to Braille for certain teachers; to provide
8 for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

10 style="text-align:center">**SECTION 1.**

11 Part 3 of Article 6 of Chapter 2 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
12 relating to educational programs, is amended by adding a new Code section to read as
13 follows:

14 "20-2-152.2.

15 (a) This Code section may be cited as the 'Blind Persons' Braille Literacy Rights and
16 Education Act.'

17 (b) For purposes of this Code section, the term:

18 (1) 'Blind or visually impaired child' means an individual who is eligible for special
19 education services pursuant to Code Section 20-2-152 and the federal Individuals with
20 Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C.A. Section 1400, et seq. and who:

21 (A) Has a visual acuity of 20/200 or less in the stronger eye with correcting lenses or
22 has a limited field of vision such that the widest diameter subtends an angular distance
23 of no greater than 20 degrees; or

24 (B) Has a medically indicated expectation of visual deterioration.

25 (2) 'Braille' means the system of reading and writing through touch commonly known
26 as standard English Braille.

27 (3) 'Individualized education program' or 'IEP' and 'IEP team' have the meanings
28 contained in section 614(d) of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20
29 U.S.C.A. Section 1414(d).

30 (4) 'Textbooks and other instructional materials' means any literary or nonliterary works
31 obtained for use in a course of study, including texts in electronic media.

32 (c) In developing the individualized education program for a student who is a blind or
33 visually impaired child, provision shall be made for instruction in Braille and the use of
34 Braille based on the outcome of an evaluation by a teacher certified by the Professional
35 Standards Commission as a special education visual impairments program teacher. Such
36 evaluation shall include the child's reading and writing skills, his or her specific needs, and
37 appropriate reading and writing media and an evaluation of the child's future need for
38 instruction in Braille or the use of Braille. Nothing in this Code section shall be construed
39 to require the use of Braille if other special education services are appropriate to the child's
40 educational needs. The provision of other appropriate services shall not preclude Braille
41 use or instruction.

42 (d) The instruction in Braille reading and writing included in the individualized education
43 program shall be sufficient to enable each blind or visually impaired child to communicate
44 effectively and efficiently with the same level of proficiency expected of the child's peers
45 of comparable ability and grade level who communicate with print and in writing. The
46 child's individualized education program shall specify:

47 (1) The outcomes obtained from the evaluation required under subsection (c) of this
48 Code section;

49 (2) How Braille will be implemented as the primary mode for learning through
50 integration with other classroom activities unless other special education services are
51 appropriate to the child's educational needs;

52 (3) The date on which Braille instruction will commence unless other special education
53 services are appropriate to the child's educational needs;

54 (4) The length of the period of instruction and the frequency and duration of each
55 instructional session; and

56 (5) For those children for whom Braille instruction is not indicated, the IEP shall include
57 a statement that the absence of Braille instruction will not impair the child's ability to read
58 and write effectively.

59 (e) All publishers of textbooks and other instructional materials sold to any local board of
60 education in this state shall be required to furnish an electronic version in which the content
61 is encoded in text suitable for conversion into Braille and synthesized speech, which has
62 been prepared using a markup language which maintains the structural integrity of the
63 information, and which can be processed by Braille translation software.

64 (f) On and after July 1, 2013, the Professional Standards Commission shall not issue or
65 renew a license to teach academic instruction to blind or visually impaired children unless
66 the educator has, as part of his or her standard renewal requirements:

67 (1) Completed a course in the teaching of Braille approved by the commission;

68 (2) Demonstrated competence in reading and writing Braille by holding a nationally
69 recognized certificate in Braille approved by the commission; or

70 (3) Passed a test in Braille approved by the commission."

71 **SECTION 2.**

72 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
