## **ADOPTED SENATE**

## A RESOLUTION

1 Urging the United States Congress to adopt and to submit to the states a balanced budget

2 amendment to the United States Constitution and to balance our current budget; and for other

- 3 purposes.
- 4 WHEREAS, the gravity of federal debt and federal obligations was established early in
- 5 American history with deficits occurring only in relation to extraordinary circumstances,
- 6 such as war; and

WHEREAS, for much of the 20th century and into the 21st, the United States has operated
on a budget deficit, including the 2010 budget year which surpassed an astounding \$1.3
trillion; and

- 10 WHEREAS, the federal debt is greater than \$16 trillion, a sum that if shared equally by each
- 11 person in America would be a burden of over \$45,000.00 per person, and yet the federal
- 12 government continues to accrue debt; and

WHEREAS, the higher the deficit, the more the government must spend on paying intereston the debt; and

- WHEREAS, compounding the debt problem is the use of deficit spending, which becomesa responsibility for future generations of Americans to assume without their consent; and
- WHEREAS, Congress has attempted to set budgetary restraints for itself in the form of abalanced budget amendment, which won wide support in 1995, failing by only one vote in
- 19 the United States Senate; and
- WHEREAS, many states have previously requested that Congress propose a constitutionalamendment requiring a balanced budget; and

- 22 WHEREAS, the growing burden of public debt is a threat to this nation's economic health,
- 23 and action must be taken to restore fiscal responsibility; and
- 24 WHEREAS, a balanced budget amendment would require the federal government not to
- 25 spend more than it receives in revenues and compel lawmakers to carefully consider choices
- about spending and taxes; and
- 27 WHEREAS, by encouraging spending control and discouraging deficit spending, a balanced
- 28 budget amendment will help put this nation on the path to lasting prosperity; and
- 29 WHEREAS, in the meantime, Congress should take the appropriate steps to adopt for the
- 30 current year and subsequent fiscal years a balanced budget so that the nation will live within
- 31 its means and thereby allow us to begin to reduce our massive accumulation of debt.
- 32 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY that the 33 members of this body hereby respectfully urge the Congress of the United States to propose and submit to the states for ratification an amendment to the United States Constitution 34 providing that, except during a war declared by the Congress of the United States pursuant 35 36 to Article I, Section 8, Clause 11 of the United States Constitution or other national emergency, the total of all federal appropriations for a fiscal year may not exceed the total 37 38 of all estimated federal revenue for that fiscal year and also providing for a spending 39 limitation.
- 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of this body respectfully urge the Congress
  41 of the United States to begin adopting balanced budgets starting with this fiscal year.
- 42 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate is authorized and directed 43 to transmit an appropriate copy of this resolution to the President of the United States, to the 44 Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate of the United States 45 Congress, and to all the members of the Georgia congressional delegation with a request that 46 this resolution be officially entered in the Congressional Record as a memorial to the 47 Congress of the United States of America.
