A RESOLUTION

1 Requesting the repeal of the \$100 billion federal sales tax on health insurance imposed by

- 2 the Affordable Care Act; and for other purposes.
- WHEREAS, Sections 9010 and 10905 of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act
 (P. L. 111-148), and Section 1406 of the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act (P.
 L. 111-152), impose an unprecedented new tax on health insurance that numerous policy
 experts agree will be passed on to individuals, working families, small employers, and
 seniors, contradicting a primary goal of health reform by making care more expensive; and
- 8 WHEREAS, the health insurance tax will cause premiums in the individual market to rise 9 an average of \$2,150 for individuals and \$5,080 for families nationally over a ten-year 10 period; and
- 11 WHEREAS, the tax will impose a \$3 billion fee on Georgians; and
- 12 WHEREAS, the health insurance tax will impact small employers over the next ten years,
- 13 reducing future private sector jobs by 125,000, with 59 percent at small businesses, and
- 14 reducing potential sales by at least \$18 billion, with 50 percent at small businesses; and
- WHEREAS, the tax could cost Georgians with a Medicare Advantage Plan an average of\$3,453 more in higher premiums and reduced benefits over ten years; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Georgia's Medicaid health plan costs could increase \$1,095 over ten years,
- 18 putting pressure on our already strained state budget; and
- 19 WHEREAS, higher premiums are a disincentive for everyone to obtain insurance coverage,
- 20 particularly younger, healthier people, who are likely to drop their policies if they become
- 21 too expensive, further eroding the risk pool and making coverage even less affordable.

- 22 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body
- 23 request that the United States Congress enact legislation to repeal the health insurance tax,
- 24 Sections 9010 and 10905 of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act and Section 1406
- 25 of the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act, to make health care more affordable
- 26 for working families, individuals, and businesses.
- 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate is authorized and directed
- 28 to transmit an appropriate copy of this resolution to members of the Georgia congressional
- 29 delegation and to the President of the United States.
