## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Article 8 of Chapter 12 of Title 16 and Code Section 31-2A-18 of the Official
- 2 Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the regulation of low THC oil and the establishment
- 3 of the Low THC Oil Patient Registry, definitions, purpose, registration cards, quarterly
- 4 reports, and waiver forms, respectively, so as to change the definition of low THC oil; to
- 5 change provisions relating to conditions eligible for use of low THC oil; to provide for
- 6 related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

## 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

8 SECTION 1.

- 9 Article 8 of Chapter 12 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the
- 10 regulation of low THC oil, is amended by revising Code Section 16-12-190, relating to the
- 11 definition of low THC oil, as follows:
- 12 "16-12-190.
- 13 As used in this article, the term 'low THC oil' means an oil that contains an amount of
- cannabidiol and not more than 5 3 percent by weight of tetrahydrocannabinol,
- 15 tetrahydrocannabinolic acid, or a combination of tetrahydrocannabinol and
- tetrahydrocannabinolic acid which does not contain plant material exhibiting the external
- morphological features of the plant of the genus Cannabis."
- 18 SECTION 2.
- 19 Code Section 31-2A-18 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the
- 20 establishment of the Low THC Oil Patient Registry, definitions, purpose, registration cards,
- 21 quarterly reports, and waiver forms, is amended in paragraph (3) of subsection (a) by deleting
- "or" at the end of subparagraph (G), by replacing the period with "; or" at the end of
- 23 subparagraph (H), and by adding a new subparagraph to read as follows:
- 24 "(I) Autism spectrum disorder."

25 SECTION 3.

All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
