The House Committee on Insurance offers the following substitute to SB 566:

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1 To amend Title 33 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to insurance, so as to 2 clarify that, under the "Surprise Billing Consumer Protection Act," a medical or traumatic 3 condition, sickness, or injury includes a mental health condition or substance use disorder 4 and that emergency medical services include post-stabilization services; to preserve a 5 covered person's financial responsibilities and a nonparticipating facility's rights with respect 6 to nonemergency medical services received from a nonparticipating facility; to clarify that, 7 for preferred provider arrangements under group or blanket accident and sickness insurance, 8 emergency services or emergency care includes health care services that are provided for a 9 mental health condition or substance use disorder and includes post-stabilization health care 10 services; to provide for related matters; to provide for an effective date and applicability; to 11 repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

14 Title 33 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to insurance, is amended by
15 revising paragraph (5) of subsection (b) of Code Section 33-20E-2, relating to application to
16 insurers and definitions regarding surprise billing, as follows:

17 "(5) 'Emergency medical services' means medical services rendered after the recent onset 18 of for a medical or traumatic condition, sickness, or injury, including a mental health 19 condition or substance use disorder, in which a person is exhibiting acute symptoms of 20 sufficient severity, including, but not limited to, severe pain, that would lead a prudent 21 layperson possessing an average knowledge of medicine and health to believe that his or 22 her condition, sickness, or injury is of such a nature that failure to obtain immediate 23 medical care could result in:

24 (A) Placing the patient's health in serious jeopardy;

25 (B) Serious impairment to bodily functions; or

26 (C) Serious dysfunction of any bodily organ or part.

27 <u>'Emergency medical services' includes medical services rendered after such person is</u>

28 stabilized and as part of outpatient observation or an inpatient or outpatient stay with

29 respect to the visit in which such services are furnished, unless each of the conditions of

Said title is further amended by adding a new subsection to Code Section 33-20E-5, relating
to payment for nonemergency medical services under the "Surprise Billing Consumer
Protection Act," to read as follows:
