A RESOLUTION

1 Honoring the life of Commissioner Allan Bradford and dedicating an intersection in his
2 memory; and for other purposes.

3 WHEREAS, the State of Georgia lost one of its finest citizens with the passing of
4 Commissioner Allan Bradford on March 23, 2021; and

5 WHEREAS, Commissioner Bradford was born in Tacoma, Washington, in 1948, and lived
6 a life of service and honor; and

7 WHEREAS, he served as a guardian of this nation's freedom and liberty with the United
8 States Army 11th Calvary, valiantly and courageously protecting America during the
9 Vietnam War; and

10 WHEREAS, his service was recognized with a Purple Heart, the Army Award of Valor, and
11 two Bronze Star medals; and

12 WHEREAS, he was elected Dade County Commissioner of District 4 Lookout Mountain in
13 2000, where he was known throughout the community for his love, encouragement, and

15 WHEREAS, a man of deep and abiding faith, Commissioner Bradford was an active member
16 of New Salem Baptist Church; and

17 WHEREAS, his leadership and guidance were invaluable to numerous organizations,
18 including the Dade County American Legion 106; and

19 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
20 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating an intersection in his memory.

21 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ENACTED BY THE GENERAL
22 ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA that the intersection of State Route 136 and State Route 189 in
23 Dade County is dedicated as the Commissioner Allan Bradford Memorial Intersection.

24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Transportation is authorized and
25 directed to erect and maintain appropriate signs dedicating the Commissioner Allan Bradford
26 Memorial Intersection.

27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate is authorized and directed
28 to make appropriate copies of this resolution available for distribution to the family of
29 Commissioner Allan Bradford and the Department of Transportation.
