

## House Resolution 274

## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Urging the General Assembly to appropriate an additional \$2 million annually to the Georgia  
2 Pregnancy and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program, in lieu of all moneys currently  
3 being appropriated to fund crisis pregnancy centers; and for other purposes.
- 4 WHEREAS, this resolution shall be named the "Fund Healthy Pregnancy and Parenting  
5 Resolution"; and
- 6 WHEREAS, in the Fiscal Year 2026 budget, the Governor has supported adding  
7 \$2.98 million to increase funds to expand a pilot program to provide in-home visits for at-risk  
8 and underserved rural communities during pregnancy and early childhood to improve birth  
9 outcomes, reduce preterm deliveries, and decrease infant and maternal mortality rates; and
- 10 WHEREAS, this program shall be referred to as the Georgia Pregnancy and Early Childhood  
11 Home Visiting Program; and
- 12 WHEREAS, this program as administered by the Department of Public Health has produced  
13 positive outcomes and is worthy of increased support; and
- 14 WHEREAS, there are approximately 89 crisis pregnancy centers in this state; and

15 WHEREAS, crisis pregnancy centers are often fronts for antiabortion activities; and

16 WHEREAS, the main purpose of these centers is often to coerce pregnant populations,  
17 especially those having unintended pregnancies, into not having an abortion rather than  
18 providing them with comprehensive, fact based reproductive care; and

19 WHEREAS, because these centers are sometimes mistaken for actual clinics providing  
20 abortion services, the state's support of their activities puts pregnant populations at greater  
21 risk; and

22 WHEREAS, no further taxpayer money should be appropriated to such centers; and

23 WHEREAS, even if Georgians did receive some benefit from such centers, abortion rights  
24 are currently restricted in this state beyond six weeks, except in special situations; therefore,  
25 there should be less need for such centers; and

26 WHEREAS, consequently, if the number of abortions occurring in this state are decreasing  
27 due to that law, the need for any services provided by such centers should also be decreasing;  
28 and

29 WHEREAS, the most recent budget appropriated approximately \$2 million to fund crisis  
30 pregnancy centers; and

31 WHEREAS, this year's budget should provide funding to the Georgia Pregnancy and Early  
32 Childhood Home Visiting Program by such amount in lieu of appropriating such moneys to  
33 crisis pregnancy centers; and

34 WHEREAS, this proposal would not cost taxpayers any additional moneys; and

35 WHEREAS, this proposal would better allocate the resources of this state to meet the needs  
36 of its residents.

37 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that  
38 members of this body urge the General Assembly to appropriate an additional \$2 million  
39 annually to the Georgia Home Visiting program to improve birth outcomes, reduce preterm  
40 deliveries, and decrease infant and maternal mortality rates, in lieu of appropriating such  
41 moneys to fund crisis pregnancy centers.

42 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized  
43 and directed to make appropriate copies of this resolution available for distribution to the  
44 General Assembly's legislative leaders.
